The bill would authorize each participating county to determine whether that county’s probation department or child welfare agency, or both, would create and operate a program funded by the pilot project to provide services to youth within that county’s jurisdiction that addresses the need for services relating to the commercial sexual exploitation of youth. The bill would also require a county that elects to participate to conduct at least one evaluation of the program’s impact and effectiveness and to submit that evaluation to the board. The bill would provide that the pilot project would be funded contingent upon an appropriation in the annual Budget Act. These funds shall be administered by the BSCC. It requires reports of expenditures, available juvenile justice trend data and available information of how they have or may have contributed to, or influenced, the juvenile justice data trends identified in the report. It provides that the annual JJCPA and YOBG county reports be combined into one report using a BSCC developed template. The BSCC would then submit one consolidated annual report to the Legislature and the Governor and post the county information on its website. Pilot counties would be required to submit data to the BSCC, and BSCC would be required to conduct an evaluation of the pilot program’s impact and effectiveness, and prepare a report to the Legislature’s Public Safety Committees.
