It would appropriate an undetermined sum to the BSCC for purposes of funding the grants. It would require counties to report specified data to BSCC by January 1, 2016, and annually thereafter. It would require the BSCC to report to the Legislature by June 15, 2015, the estimated need, cost, and schedule for each county to collect and report data as required.
