AB 1730 Human trafficking: minors. The bill would authorize each participating county to determine whether that county's probation department or child welfare agency, or both, would create and operate a program funded by the pilot project to provide services to youth within that county's jurisdiction that addresses the need for services relating to the commercial sexual exploitation of youth. The bill would also require a county that elects to participate to conduct at least one evaluation of the program's impact and effectiveness and to submit that evaluation to the board. The bill would provide that the pilot project would be funded contingent upon an appropriation in the annual Budget Act. These funds shall be administered by the BSCC. Note: There is not an appropriation in this year's budget.	Responsible for establishing the pilot program and for collecting the county's evaluation of the programs.	<u>9/26/16</u> - Vetoed Veto Message: I am returning Assembly Bill 1730 without my signature. This bill authorizes a pilot project in four counties to provide services for youth victims of commercial sex trafficking contingent upon an appropriation in the state budget. There are numerous federal, state and local efforts underway to combat commercial sexual exploitation of children. In this year's budget, the state provided \$19 million to fund the development of trafficking prevention and intervention services. Establishing a new pilot program in this area should be considered in the budget process.

Pilot counties are required to submit data to the BSCC, and BSCC is required to conduct an evaluation of the pilot program's impact and effectiveness, and prepare a report to the Legislature's Public Safety Committees. It authorizes BSCC to contract with an independent entity, including, but not limited to, the Regents of the University of California, to complete the evaluation. If a local detention facility does not have existing space available for in-person visitation, the bill would require the facility to comply no later than January 1, 2022.	No anticipated impact but the BSCC would be responsible for updating regulations if necessary.	9/27/16 – Vetoed Veto Message: I am returning Senate Bill 1157 without my signature. This bill would prohibit the exclusive use of video visitation at local correctional facilities. This bill as drafted does not provide adequate flexibility and creates a strict mandate. Nevertheless, I am concerned about the recent trend of making jail facilities unavailable for in-person visits. This practice could have an adverse impact on achieving rehabilitative goals and might affect in a negative way the families and loved ones of those incarcerated. I am directing the Board of State and Community Corrections to work with stakeholders to explore ways to address these issues.
