## **Annual Compliance Monitoring Tasks**

**Identification**: Identify what law enforcement facilities must be included in "compliance monitoring universe." Currently over 1,200.

Classification: Are facilities holding adults and/or juveniles? In secure or nonsecure detention? Are they residential or not? Public or private?

**Inspection:** Annual inspection of all facilities holding adults and youth in secure detention. Triennial inspection of others.

**Data Collection**: Annual surveys for identification and classification; monthly data collection for numbers and types of violations.

## **Definitions, for purposes of Compliance Monitoring**

**Adult Inmate:** An individual who has reached the age of full criminal responsibility under applicable state law and has been arrested and is in custody for or awaiting trial on a criminal charge, or is convicted of a criminal offense.

**Juvenile Offender**: A juvenile offender who has been charged with or adjudicated for conduct that would, under the law of the jurisdiction in which the offense was committed, be a crime if committed by an adult.

**Status Offender:** A juvenile who has been charged with or adjudicated for conduct which would not, under the law of the jurisdiction in which the offense was committed, be a crime if committed by an adult.

**Non Offender:** Juvenile who is subject to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court, usually under abuse, dependency, or neglect statutes or as an alien juvenile, for reasons other than legally prohibited conduct of the juvenile.

Secure Detention: A means of custody by being physically secured to a stationary object, such as a cuffing rail, or in a locked room or enclosure.

**Non Secure Detention**: A means of custody where the individual has freedom of movement. Juveniles will have constant direct visual observation by staff.

**Juvenile Detention Facility**: In California, a juvenile hall, special purpose juvenile hall or camp.

**Jail**: A locked facility, administered by state, county, or local law enforcement and correctional agencies, the purpose of which is to detain adults charged with violating criminal law, pending trial. In California, a Type II, III or IV facility.

**Lockup**: A locked facility that is used by a state, unit of local government, or any law enforcement authority to detain or confine adults. Similar to an adult jail, except that an adult lockup is generally a municipal or police facility of a temporary nature that does not hold persons after they have been formally charged. In California, generally a police department lockup, city jail or sheriff's substation.
