This bill would require BSCC to add three more counties to receive funding and would require the BSCC to issue grants in an amount of not less than \$300,000 and not more than \$2,000,000, up to a maximum of \$10,000,000. The bill would extend repeal the program until as of January 1, 2025. Among other things, the bill would require the county to clearly demonstrate that the proposed contract will result in actual overall costs savings to the county and to show that the contract does not cause the displacement of county workers. The bill would require that all use of pepper spray be documented. The working group would develop guidelines for policy and procedure decisions and make policy and fiscal recommendations to the Legislature for potential revisions to state law. A "Federal Promise Zone" is any area with a continuous boundary and a population of not more than 200,000 that is nominated by a local government or Indian tribe and designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to receive priority for federal funding on the basis of its unemployment, poverty, vacancy, and crime rates. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of a California Promise Zone. SB 1106 Young adults: deferred entry of judgment pilot program. This bill would extend the operative date of the authorization to establish a pilot program in those counties to January 1, 2022. The bill would also expand the scope of the program to include the County of Ventura. This bill would also require the board to submit the comprehensive report to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Public Safety no later than December 31, 2020.
