This bill would: 1) implement a revised pretrial release procedure which would require the judge or magistrate to consider a pretrial services report and to order the pretrial release of the person, with or without conditions, subject to the person signing a specified release agreement, 2) require each county to establish a pretrial services agency for these purposes; and 3) require the BSCC, in consultation with a newly established pretrial services agency, to develop a plan that establishes statewide requirements for counties relating to annual reporting of pretrial release and detention information. The bill would require the BSCC to award grants to local law enforcement agencies to provide supplemental law enforcement services to private schools, as provided. The bill would appropriate \$10,000,000 from the General Fund to the board for these purposes. The bill would allow a county or county agency to contract for personal services currently or customarily performed by employees, as applicable, when specified conditions are met. Among other things, the bill would require the county to clearly demonstrate that the proposed contract will result in actual overall costs savings to the county and to show that the contract does not cause the displacement of county workers. The bill would also require the BSCC to make this data available quarterly on its website. A "Federal Promise Zone" is any area with a continuous boundary and a population of not more than 200,000 that is nominated by a local government or Indian tribe and designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to receive priority for federal funding on the basis of its unemployment, poverty, vacancy, and crime rates. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of a California Promise Zone.
