The bill would extend the program until January 1, 2025. The bill would allow a county or county agency to contract for personal services currently or customarily performed by employees, as applicable, when specified conditions are met. Among other things, the bill would require the county to clearly demonstrate that the proposed contract will result in actual overall costs savings to the county and to show that the contract does not cause the displacement of county workers. 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<b>AB 2866</b> Cannabis regulation. This bill would continuously appropriate the funds from these civil penalties to the BSCC. (2) This bill would, in addition to any other penalty, if the controlled substance is cannabis that is being sold or distributed in violation of state or local law, require that any excessive profits, as defined, obtained from the use of a building, room, space, or enclosure in violation of the above specified law, be subject to seizure. The bill would appropriate the seized funds to the BSCC.</p> <p>*California Proposition 64, the California Marijuana Legalization Initiative, was on the <a href="#">November 8, 2016, ballot</a> and was approved. A "Federal Promise Zone" is any area with a continuous boundary and a population of not more than 200,000 that is nominated by a local government or Indian tribe and designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to receive priority for federal funding on the basis of its unemployment, poverty, vacancy, and crime rates. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of a California Promise Zone. This bill would extend the operative date of the authorization to establish a pilot program in those counties to January 1, 2022. The bill would also expand the scope of the program to include the County of Ventura. This bill would also require the BSCC to submit a comprehensive report to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Public Safety no later than December 31, 2020.
