This bill would require BSCC to add three more counties to receive funding and would require the BSCC to issue grants in an amount of not less than \$300,000 and not more than \$2,000,000, up to a maximum of \$10,000,000. The bill would extend the program until January 1, 2025.	BSCC would be required to expand the Pay for Success grant program.	Senate: Dead.
AB 1065 Theft: aggregation: organized retail theft.	Assembly Member Jones-Sawyer (D-59)	Enrolled 8/29/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/fares/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180AB1065	This bill creates the crime of organized retail theft and expands jurisdiction to prosecute cases of theft or receipt of stolen merchandise. It would require the BSCC to, upon appropriation, award funding for a grant program to four or more county superior courts or county probation departments to create demonstration projects to reduce the recidivism of high-risk misdemeanor probationers using risk assessments at sentencing and formal probation. BSCC would be required to develop county reporting requirements and submit a final report to the Legislature and county criminal justice officials. This bill establishes a sunset date of January 1, 2021.	BSCC would be required to administer the grant program, develop reporting requirements and submit a final report.	Assembly: Enrollment.

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AB 1250 Counties: contracts for personal services. The bill would allow a county or county agency to contract for personal services currently or customarily performed by employees, as applicable, when specified conditions are met. Among other things, the bill would require the county to clearly demonstrate that the proposed contract will result in actual overall costs savings to the county and to show that the contract does not cause the displacement of county workers.	This bill would impact how counties can subcontract. BSCC's grant administration flexibility would be reduced.	Senate: Dead.
AB 2504 Peace officer training: sexual orientation and gender identity. 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AB 2568 County jails: veterans. AB 2866 Cannabis regulation.	Assembly Member Cooper (D-9)	Amended 4/19/18 https://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180AB2866	<p>This bill would generate additional Prop 64* related funds in two ways: (1) This bill would make a violation of the advertisements and marketing provision requirement (adding a licensee's license number to advertisements) by a cannabis-related business using a fictitious license number subject to a civil penalty of \$10,000 per incident. This bill would continuously appropriate the funds from these civil penalties to the BSCC. (2) This bill would, in addition to any other penalty, if the controlled substance is cannabis that is being sold or distributed in violation of state or local law, require that any excessive profits, as defined, obtained from the use of a building, room, space, or enclosure in violation of the above specified law, be subject to seizure. The bill would appropriate the seized funds to the BSCC.</p> <p>*California Proposition 64, the California Marijuana Legalization Initiative, was on the November 8, 2016, ballot and was approved. It creates, among other things, a BSCC grant program.</p>	BSCC anticipates that this will be a formula grant – it would be a separate program from the one resulting from Prop 64.	Assembly: Dead.

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SB 10 Pretrial release or detention: pretrial services.	Senator Hertzberg (D-18)	Enrolled 8/28/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/fares/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB10	This bill creates a risk-based non-monetary prearrest and pretrial release system for people arrested for criminal offenses including preventative detention procedures for person's determined to be too high a risk to assure public safety if released. Upon appropriation, BSCC would be required to contract with an academic institution, public policy center, or other research entity for an independent evaluation on the impact this legislation has, specifically looking at the impact by race, ethnicity, gender, and income level.	BSCC is required to contract for an independent evaluation to be completed no later than January 1, 2024.	Senate: Chaptered.
SB 1106 Young adults: deferred entry of judgment pilot program.	Senator Hill (D-13)	Enrolled 8/31/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/fares/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB1106	Existing law authorizes, only until January 1, 2020, the Counties of Alameda, Butte, Napa, Nevada, and Santa Clara to establish a pilot program to operate a deferred entry of judgment pilot program for eligible defendants. This bill extends the operative date of the authorization to establish a pilot program in those counties to January 1, 2022. The bill also expands the scope of the program to include the County of Ventura. This bill also provides a due date for BSCC to submit a comprehensive report to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Public Safety of December 31, 2020.	Adds an additional county and a due date for the BSCC to submit a Legislative Report no later than December 31, 2020.	Senate: Enrollment.

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SB 1142 The Getting Home Safe Act.	Senator Skinner (D-9)	Amended 8/23/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB1142	This bill would, beginning June 1, 2019, require the sheriff to make the release standards, processes, and schedules of a county jail available to the public and to incarcerated persons. The bill would also provide a person with the right to request assistance in entering a drug or alcohol rehabilitation program, upon their release, and would require the county jail to provide transportation. The bill would also require a person scheduled to be released from jail between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. or sundown, whichever is later, to be released during that time.	BSCC would be required to establish a Late-Night Release Prevention Task Force.	Senate: Dead.
