

Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act - Youthful Offender Block Grant 2018 Expenditure and Data Report Due Date: October 1, 2018

On or before October 1, 2018, each county is required to submit to the Board of State & Community Corrections (BSCC) a report on its Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) and Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) programs during the preceding year. For JJCPA this requirement can be found at Government Code (GC) Section 30061(b)(4)(C) and for YOBG it can be found at Welfare & Institutions Code Section (WIC) 1961(c). These code sections both call for a consolidated report format that includes a description of the programs and other activities supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds, an accounting of all JJCPA and YOBG expenditures during the prior fiscal year, and countywide juvenile justice trend data.

Prior to submitting this report save the file using the following naming convention: "(County Name) 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report." For example, Yuba County would name its file "Yuba 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report".

Once the report is complete, attach the file to an email and send it to: JJCPA-YOBG@bscc.ca.gov. All reports will be posted to the BSCC website following a brief technical review. We encourage you to review your report for accuracy before sending it to the BSCC. Please do **NOT** change the report form to a PDF document.

ANALYSIS OF COUNTYWIDE TREND DATA for:

Solano County, like many counties throughout the state, has seen a continued decline in arrests since 2006. The California Department of Justice (DOJ) Open Justice data reports for 2017 show Solano County juveniles were arrested for 323 felony offenses, 698 misdemeanor offenses, and 35 status offenses. This is a total reduction of 133 arrests from the previous year. The most frequent felony offenses for which Solano County juveniles were arrested were for violent offenses (123) and property offenses (118). The number of violent offenses decreased by 9 from the previous year, while the property crimes indicated a slight increase of 21. A smaller number of youth were arrested for drug offenses (2) and sex offenses (5).

While the juvenile arrests have gradually decreased, simultaneously, the number of justice involved youth under probation supervision has decreased. In 2017, according to the DOJ Juvenile Court & Probation Statistical System (JCPSS) report, Solano County Wardship placements totaled 317. This is a total reduction of 69 cases from the former year. Alternative resolutions offered include informal probation (15), diversion (285), non-ward probation (14), and Deferred Entry of Judgment (5).

With the funding support of the Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act & Youthful Offender Block Grant (JJCPA-YOBG), Solano County continued efforts to enhance our system of care to address the myriad of issues for our at-risk youth. This includes prevention and early intervention programs, community based services and supervision, residential interventions, and secure care.

In previous years, a concerted effort was made to develop more robust early intervention and prevention programs. The data analysis for 2017 is a reflection of our continued efforts. During the calendar year of 2017, 285 youth were offered diversion services. As compared to the former year, this is an increase of 124 additional youth diverted from the formal system. Through the Juvenile Community Accountability Program (JCAP), low level or first time offenders are given the chance at informal intervention through the JCAP program rather than being formally processed through the court system. The program uses restorative justice techniques to help youth understand the harm their actions have had on the community or victim. Felony and misdemeanor diversion programs have expanded and were modified to be more in line with evidence based practices.

Although we've seen a continued reduction of petition filings, for those that have the filing of a petition (382 new filings), supervision and intervention services are afforded. This includes mental health and substance abuse services, and mentoring services, for example. With the support of the JJCPA funding, those at-risk youth warranting a higher level of intervention were referred to the Day Reporting Centers (DRC). Interventions included mentoring, counseling, cognitive behavioral intervention, tutoring, job and life skills, and reentry coordination.

In 2017, a very small number (24) of youth needed elevated care to a residential foster care or group home setting. As part of AB403, the continuum of care reform (CCR), probation continued in our dual efforts to both reduce the time youth spend in group home placements and encourage the use of approved Resource Families designated to provide care for youth in need of a community based home. During this reporting period, 65 youth were court ordered to a secure county facility (reduced by 16 from 2016), however, this number includes those offered electronic monitoring community supervision in lieu of custody. Also included are those youth ordered to the JDF and Challenge Academy. Secure facility placement programs offer intervention and treatment services in an alternative and less restrictive environment than that of the Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ). Providing alternative care and placement options results in a limited number of youth commitments to DJJ. In 2017, only 4 youth were placed in DJJ by Solano County. With the funding afforded through JJCPA-YOBG, Solano County Probation is able to both implement and sustain multiple prevention, treatment and rehabilitative services, including a variety of programs and placements in an effort to rehabilitate, reduce recidivism and ultimately gain greater success for youth and families we service.

YOBG funding supported direct placement costs of high risk/high need youth who required specific residential intervention. These placements provided an alternative placement for youth whose delinquent behaviors were escalating. These youth committed serious offenses and the circumstances posed a continued risk to the community. Providing these services as an alternative reduced the likelihood that the youth would be placed at the Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) in the future. Specialized intervention services focused on treatment and rehabilitation included individual counseling, cognitive based therapy programming, sex offender treatment, along with educational and vocational components with the goal of helping the youth obtain the skills needed to ultimately transition successfully from the juvenile justice system.

YOBG and JJCPA funding has been used to support the contract of a community based treatment provider (Aldea Children's Services) that provided individual, group, and family counseling services for minors under probation supervision. This includes youth in the community and residing with parent(s) or guardian(s). The provider also served minors in custody as well as those reentering the community from the department's Juvenile Detention Facility and Challenge Program. Services were geared to assist the family in coping, and to increase the family functioning with the effort towards recidivism reduction. Counseling services were offered one or two times per week based on individual need. The provider continued to work collaboratively with the probation officers to help coordinate any additional services the minor or family identified via the initial assessment. Services have been aimed at increasing positive behavior change within the entire family system and increasing the family's overall level of functioning by teaching new skills thereby reducing family conflict. Continued effort is made to strengthen the family system, utilizing evidence based and informed practices including Trauma Informed Care and Dialectical Behavioral Therapy.

YOBG funds are used to support the purchase of gift card incentives that are provided to youth who demonstrate positive behaviors, completion of programs, positive progress in school and in the community. These are distributed based upon the departments Juvenile Incentives and Sanctions grid. Staff provide incentives as a result of positive behaviors to acknowledge and encourage future positive behaviors from youth on their caseloads. Additionally, this funding supported the purchase of bus passes for youth facing transportation barriers and in need. By eliminating the issues surrounding transportation, youth were able to get

YOBG funding in this category continued to fund critically needed mental health services to 296 minors placed

at the Juvenile Detention Facility. This is a reduction from 527 the former year and a reflection of our efforts to only detain youth that are a threat to the community, themselves, or who a pose a flight risk. A modification of our booking criteria has resulted in fewer youth in custody, however, this results in a higher concentration of youth with significant mental health needs. Youth received a continuum of care including initial screening assessments, detailed evaluations, crisis interventions, medication evaluation and monitoring, referrals for 5150 evaluation, and general ongoing mental health support. A twenty four hour mobile crisis unit was utilized as a back-up resource. A clinician on site provided individual and group sessions to address mental health and social needs. Services and support in the mental health arena is essential for youth in the juvenile justice system, particularly for detained youth. The goal of this service is to assure that there is a primary focus on the mental health issues that present themselves for minors in a confined setting. The benefits include the ability to substantially reduce the risk of self-harm that this experience can sometimes provoke for them.

The Electronic Monitoring Program (EMP) program has been used as a limit setting and supervision tool aimed at monitoring for minors who would have otherwise been detained at the Juvenile Detention Center. By utilizing a less restrictive option, youth are allowed to receive services in the community while remaining in the home. Youth placed onto this location monitoring program were monitored by a group counselor assigned to field services, or a case manager through the Leaders in Community Alternatives program. These minors are contacted by the group counselors in the home and at school. The funding supports services and supplies needed for minors placed on the EMP program. In turn, this saves detention days and reduces the need for associated overtime costs.

YOBG funding in this category was used to provide substance abuse services to juveniles county-wide and in accordance with their individualized treatment plan. This funding provides for a 1.0 FTE Licensed Therapist to provide evaluation, and afford evidence based clinical intervention and support to youth struggling with substance use. The continued goal is to reduce symptoms, increase coping ability to handle various life stressors and to ultimately achieve long-term recovery.

YOBG funding supported the contract with the W. Haywood Burns Institute (BI). BI is a national nonprofit organization that works to reduce racial and ethnic disparities (R.E.D.) in the justice system by building a community-centered response to youthful misbehavior that is equitable and restorative, using a data driven, consensus based approach. BI conducted a Readiness Assessment Consultation (RAC) with the Solano County Probation Department. The RAC was conducted to determine the nature and extent of disparities in the County's youth justice system as well as assess the County's strengths and areas in need of improvement regarding the capacity to engage in a successful disparity reduction effort. Work with BI included an evaluation of the detention population via data collection and analysis, and strategizing around policy and practice changes to reduce R.E.D. in our local criminal justice system.

YOBG funding in this category was used to provide the department with tools to evaluate programs for effectiveness and quality assurance. The provider reviewed treatment programs and services and assessed whether the services provided are based upon evidence based principles and practices. The provider utilized evidence based programming curriculum, based on the most prevalent client criminogenic needs. This expenditure supported enhanced training for probation staff in Effective Practices for Correctional Supervision (EPICS). These techniques and principals improve supervision skills, communication, relationship building and overall intervention strategies with clients. In addition, YOBG dollars provided funding for Cognitive Behavioral Training (CBT) for Juvenile Detention Facility Staff. CBT behavioral therapy approach focuses on helping offenders improve their social skills, critical reasoning, moral reasoning, impulse management and self-efficacy. CBT has been proven effective in skill building approaches and recidivism reduction. Division staff were also afforded a unique opportunity to participate at the Juvenile Probation Reform Academy. The information provided and insights gleaned will aid in making meaningful policy and practice changes geared towards improving outcomes for youth under our jurisdiction.

Staffing by Funding Source:

JJCPA: (2.0) FTE Senior Deputy Probation Officers, (1) Supervising Deputy Probation Officer, (1) 30% of System Analyst FTE position.

YOBG: (1) FTE Supervising Group Counselor, (1) FTE Group Counselor, (1) .5 FTE Legal Procedures clerk, (1) .5 FTE Deputy Probation Officer, (1) 30% of System Analyst position.

YOBG funds paid for the salary and benefits of a Group Counselor mentor identified to support youth released from the JDF, Challenge and other out of home residential placements. A mentor partnered with the probation officer to help monitor and support the transition of the youth the first 60-90 days following release from the program. This helps the youth re-acclimate back into the community by providing a positive support system. The mentor assisted the probation officer in the development of a transition plan for the youth, prior to entering aftercare. The focus is on positive integration back to their family, school and community. YOBG also paid for the salary and benefits of the identified supervisor. The supervisor monitored the trainings and support for continued quality assurance. Program review included groups such as Aggression Replacement Training, Thinking for a Change and substance abuse counseling. During this reporting period the supervisor continued efforts on the redesigning of programming for youth in custody. The supervisor received training in data collection and relevance to evidence based practices. The supervisor worked closely with a consultant to address program development, and strengthen staff abilities in programing while managing youth in custody. JJCPA funding supported the salaries and benefits of two Senior Deputy Probation Officers who worked primarily with youth receiving intensive supervision and intervention services through the DRC. YOBG funding partially supported a (SSA) Senior Systems Analyst position as well. The SSA supports the division in collecting, and analyzing data for management and probation officers. This information allows the Department to make data driven decisions regarding allocations, resources and staffing. This position will also support the Department in meeting local and state reporting requirements.
