This bill would require the revenue collected from that tax to be used to fund grants through the CalVIP program. * Existing law established the CalVIP grant program and required the BSCC to distribute grants to cities and community-based organizations to fund violence intervention and prevention activities. The current CalVip grant cycle is scheduled to end on April 30, 2020 (cohort 1) and August 31, 2020 (cohort 2). Note: The Governor's FY 19/20 Budget Proposal includes \$9 million to fund CalVIP.
