As a result of the PATH program the contacts exceeded the 290 with our DRC clients.

PATH, DRC/probation staff, and other allied agencies continue working towards one common goal as we provide the best rehabilitative efforts for our clients. Meetings are conducted weekly to reevulate and meet client's needs.

Furthermore, with the recent shortening of probationary grants, clients are having a difficult time completing secondary programming prior to termination. As a result, 24/7 Dad has had low enrollment numbers.


