21. What challenges in meeting the above program and service needs?

The Courts are still backlogged and place matters on calendar as does the county face requested by the Courts. We continue to have fiscal challenges throughout our county budgets. Transportation for our clients is an ongoing barrier, which we hope to resolve soon with a Mobile Unit funded by a grant, which will bring services and probation staff to rural areas of Madera County, which will decrease failures to appear/warrants and increase contact with probation and the Courts. Additionally housing for our low-income and unhoused population is an additional barrier. We are fortunate to have the Madera Rescue Mission which helps to mitigate homelessness and soon will build tiny homes.

22. What programmatic changes and/or course corrections has the CPP made in the implementation of Public Safety Realignment that it believes other counties would find helpful?

We are planning on hiring more qualified staff. The CCP will begin to vet more referrals to services for in-patient programs to ensure referrals are fair and consistent between participants, especially for Mental Health clients or the unhoused.

23. Describe a local best practice or promising program that has produced positive results. If data exists to support the results, please share.

The Edovo tablet program in the jail institution continues to be a positive reward incentive program. There are still positive outcomes with the Photovoltaic (solar) vocational program, which has received national recognition. The Parent Project parenting program continues to excel and help parents learn effective parenting skills and how to be more responsive to their teenager's needs. BHS has a new Mental Health service (CARE) which is a 24-hour crisis response team. They respond within minutes and help mitigate mental health crisis situations. The new Probation Transition Services Center (TSC) includes Workforce, BHS, Family Support, Containment Counseling, Batterer's Intervention Program for indigent population, with the goal to improve positive outcomes for job training, employment and counseling services based on their assessment needs. The TSC will bridge the gap in services by providing on-site referrals, immediate assessments, counseling and immediate support from a Program Specialist and Probation staff.
