<b>Goal</b>	Manage impact on jail population capacity through electronic monitoring as an alternative sentencing option
Objective	Manage jail population while maintaining public safety
Outcome Measure	Jail population remains below maximum capacity
Progress toward stated goal	Jail population levels exceeded maximum capacity 6.3% of the fiscal year.

<b>Goal</b>	Provide rehabilitative interventions for realignment offenders
Objective	Provide evidence-based programming, treatment and therapy
Outcome Measure	Program participation rates
Outcome Measure	Program successful completion rates
Progress Toward Stated Goal	Based on the limitations still posed by COVID-19 regulations and precautions, as well as the displacement of the Day Reporting Center, participation and successful completion rates have been impacted. Group meetings have been held remotely, which has been helpful for those experiencing transportation obstacles. On the other hand, it limits the engagement and interaction environment found at in-person group meetings.

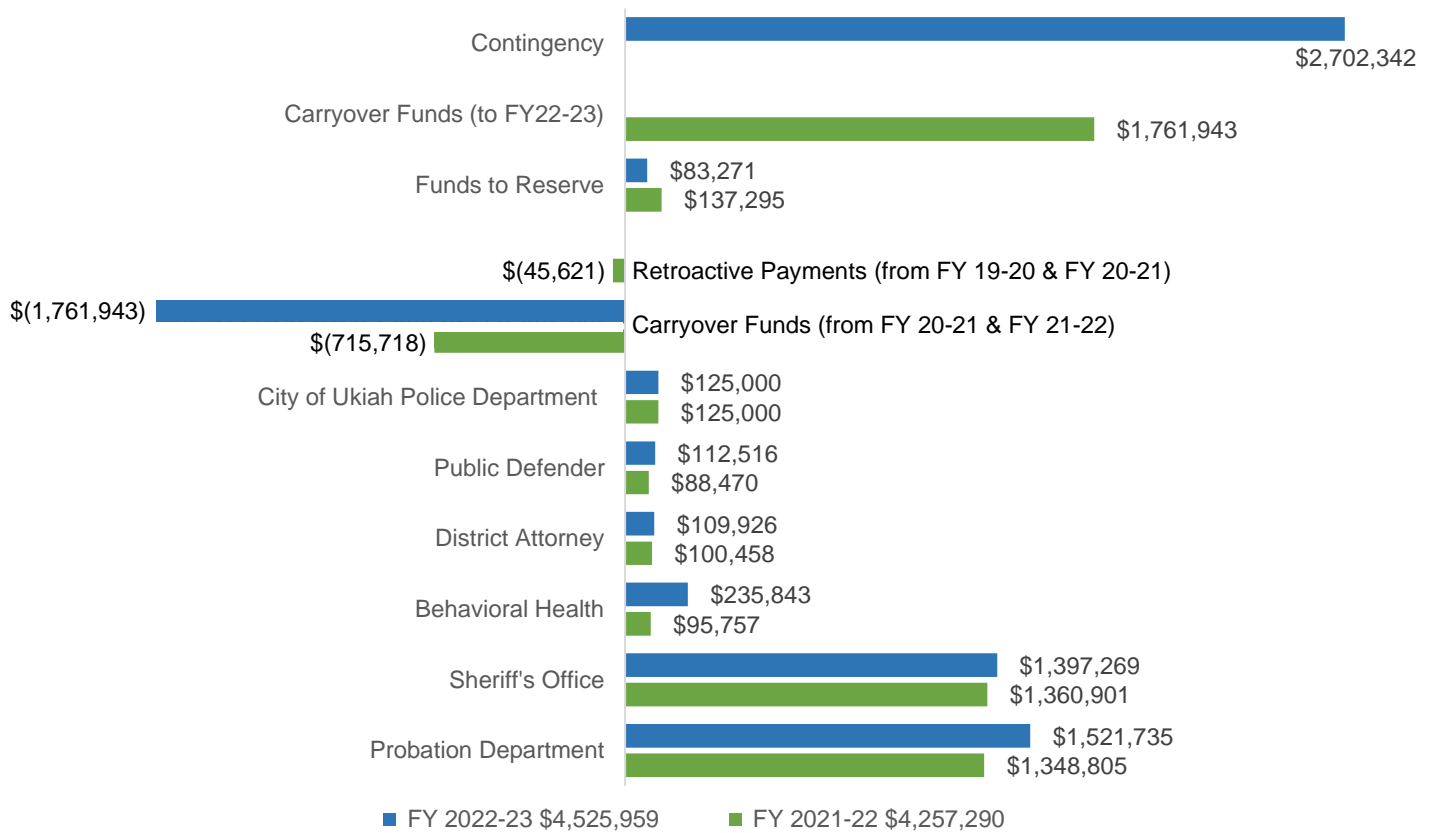

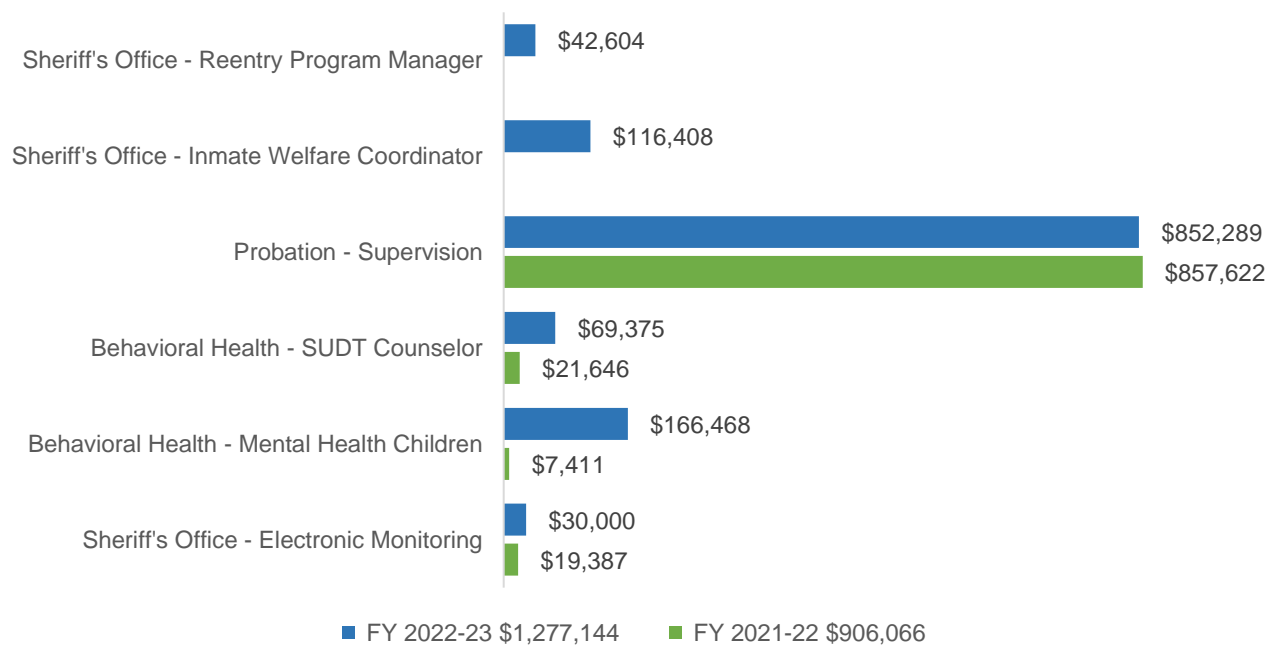

## FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-23 Allocation Comparison

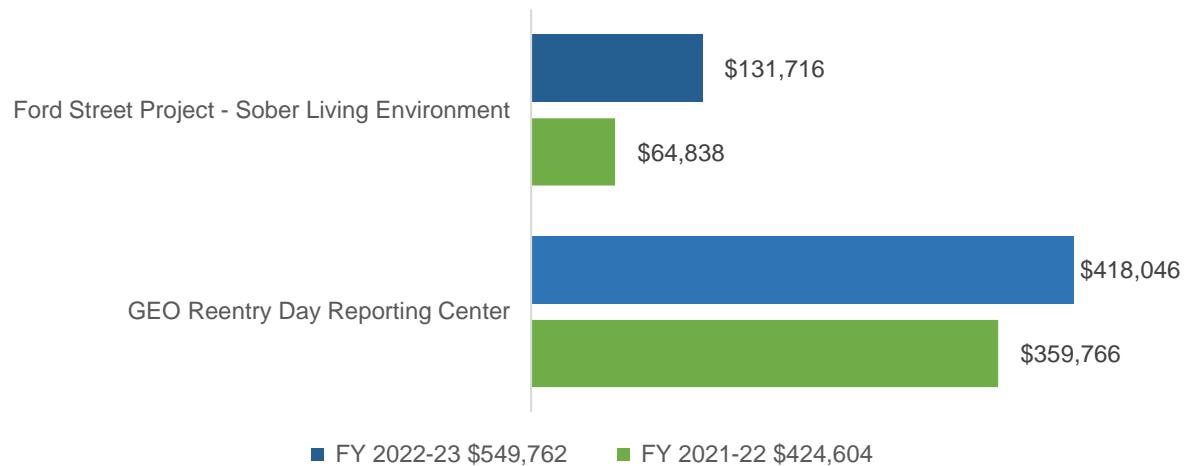
### FY 21-22 and 22-23 Allocations

#### Describe the process the CCP uses to determine potential programs and/or services for local implementation using Realignment funds?

Recent fiscal year funding allocations have limited the CCP from considering program expansion. With additional funding available, the CCP will be exploring implementation of new programs and services. Starting this fiscal year the CCP will advertise the opportunity for community based organizations to present new program and services proposals at the February CCP meeting. This is the same meeting that the current CCP funded community providers present their annual participation and outcomes report. The new proposals and current programming outcomes will be reviewed and considered for budget discussion and approval at the March Special Budget Meetings.

**What challenges does your county face in meeting these program and service needs?**

Housing and employment need of offenders, expanding jail programs and services to meet inmate needs, expanding services to reach offenders residing in more remote areas of the county, enhancing data collections and programs, lack of resources (staff & funding). Realignment funding levels continue to be a challenge as the cost of providing services increases at a rate higher than funding. We are still facing COVID-19 pandemic challenges in being able to provide the various programs and services while complying with mandated and recommended best practices. Staff and providers have had to find alternative ways to continue providing adequate supervision and services. In addition, the facility in which our Day Reporting Center resided was irreparably damaged by a fire in July of 2021. The DRC has been operating from the conference area of the Probation Department ever since as a temporary solution until a new building location is made available. This has limited the DRC's programming and services capabilities.
