The Executive Community Corrections Partnership in Fiscal Year 2022/2023 funded a Probation Program Specialist dedicated to facilitating and overseeing cognitive behavioral and evidence-based programs. In order to uphold the fidelity of quality program services, Probation will lease has the CPP made in a property solely for this purpose. Dubbed "Pathways to Success", this the implementation of program will use a multiagency collaborative approach to work with clients needing different levels of care, services, and support. The property is conveniently located across the street from the new adult services office.

23. Describe a local best practice or promising program that has produced positive results. If data exists to support the results, please share.

Inkoff.Me Mobile Tattoo Removal Service is designed to provide safe and effective tattoo removal for clients who would like to remove the stigmatizing tattoos located in highly visible areas such as the face, neck, hands, and arms that often create a barrier to employment eligibility. The program started mid-fiscal year January 2023, and 59 clients participated in the service.

# Optional Highlight or Success Story

On September 6, 2022, a client attended the Phoenix Project Orientation with the Merced County Office of Education. The Phoenix Project refers clients to various vocational trade schools and provides a stiped while attending. Five months later, on February 23, 2023, he graduated from Modesto Technical College with an Industrial Maintenance Mechanic certification. He was immediately hired with Sun Valley Smoked Meats in Manteca as a full time mechanic. Since that time the client has not reoffended and his Probation is set to expire in February 2024.

A Staff Services Analyst provides data collection and analysis of AB 109 programs and services. The total amount allocated was the entirety of the salary and benefits of the position, \$153,126. In addition, a Probation Program Specialist provides programmatic evaluation services for all adult program services. The total salary of that position is \$163,568. In total, \$300,306 was dedicated to data collection and evaluation.
