Progress Toward Stated Goal	Parenting classes, Life Skills classes, Mental Health counseling, and Substance Use groups are provided to inmates by Behavioral Health and Training, Employment, and Community Help Inc. (T.E.A.C.H.) directly in the jail. Eligible inmates are being enrolled in MediCal 30 days prior to release date to seamlessly continue psychotropic medication and mental health services. Inmates are given a small supply of medications upon their release from custody to assist in the transition into the new Drug Medi-Cal Regional Program with Partnership Health Plan. At this time, Modoc's greatest challenge is housing. With the limited housing available in the county, clients released from secure facilities often have no option but to return to the same environment from which they came.		





FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-23 Allocation Comparison


FY 21-22 and 22-23 Allocations
