## Goals, Objectives, and Outcome Measures

### FY 2021-22

<b>Goal</b>	Development of a jail facility that is safer for inmates and staff and provides for the safe and effective delivery of services.
Objective	New jail facility.
Objective	Provide continuity of health services in jail.
Objective	Provide employment opportunities for persons in custody.
Outcome Measure	New jail facility still in planning stages. Additional funding has been provided by the CCP Committee from AB109 reserve funds.
Progress toward stated goal	Following changes to the states funding plan for jail-related grant money, the CCP committee voted to allocate additional funding from the CCP reserve fund to use for jail planning. At this time, planning is still underway.

<b>Goal</b>	Reduce recidivism
Objective	Establish clients on Medical prior to leaving custody.
Objective	Provide a path from training to work furlough to full time employment.
Objective	Provide housing for clients leaving secure facilities.
Outcome Measure	Decreased recidivism rates among target client demographics.
Progress Toward Stated Goal	<p>Parenting classes, Life Skills classes, Mental Health counseling, and Substance Use groups are provided to inmates by Behavioral Health and Training, Employment, and Community Help Inc. (T.E.A.C.H.) directly in the jail. Eligible inmates are being enrolled in MediCal 30 days prior to release date to seamlessly continue psychotropic medication and mental health services. Inmates are given a small supply of medications upon their release from custody to assist in the transition into the new Drug Medi-Cal Regional Program with Partnership Health Plan.</p> <p>At this time, Modoc's greatest challenge is housing. With the limited housing available in the county, clients released from secure facilities often have no option but to return to the same environment from which they came.</p>

<b>Goal</b>	Save Lives
Objective	Reduce homelessness.
Objective	Distribute Narcan to first responders.
Progress Toward Stated Goal	<p>Probation clients without housing are lodged at a local motel paid for through AB109 funds for up to a month. Additionally, Social Services provides longer term housing solutions, and these two agencies work together to ensure a seamless transition for homeless clients. Furthermore, a Probation Technician has been assigned to transfer cases. The goal of this is to help clients who might do better living with family out of county to successfully transfer their cases.</p>

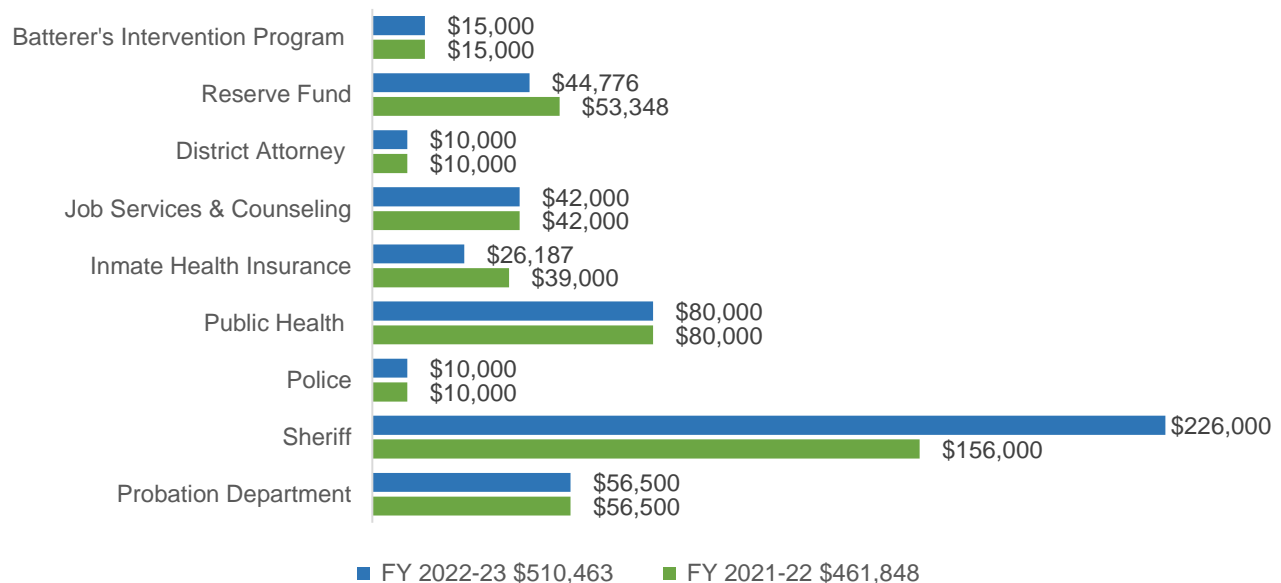
## Goals, Objectives, and Outcome Measures

### FY 2022-23

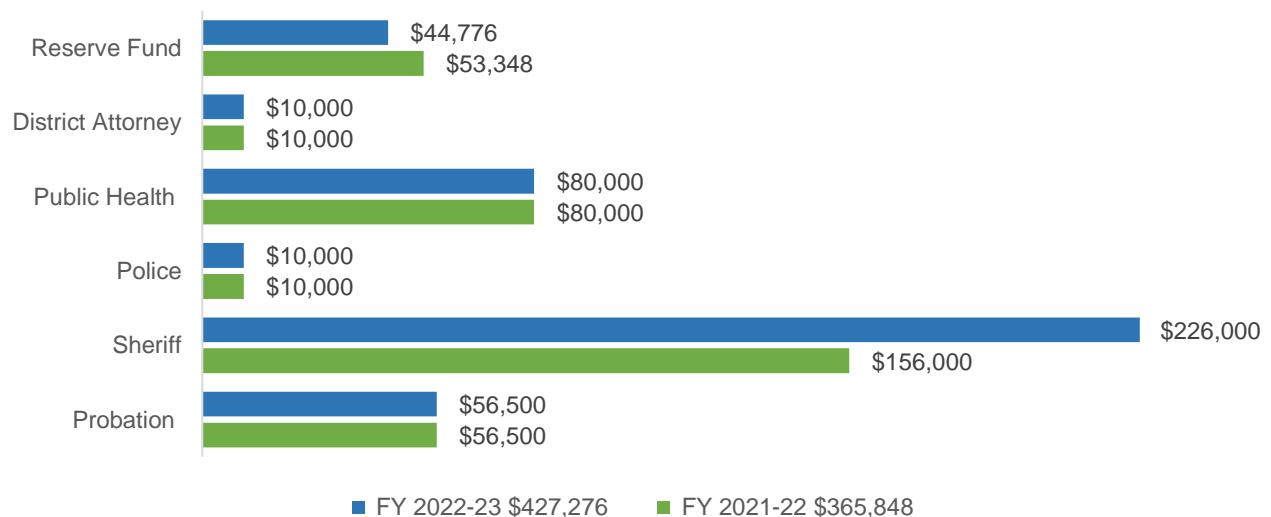
<b>Goal</b>	Implement Drug Court
<b>Objective</b>	Establish a drug court to provide targeted treatment to substance abuse clients.
<b>Outcome Measure</b>	Establish and fund a drug court.
<b>Progress toward stated goal</b>	Currently, the county is looking into whether staffing is available to establish a drug court. If this proves to be the case, a drug court will be implemented using JAG funding and staffed by partners on the CCP committee.

## FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-23 Allocation Comparison

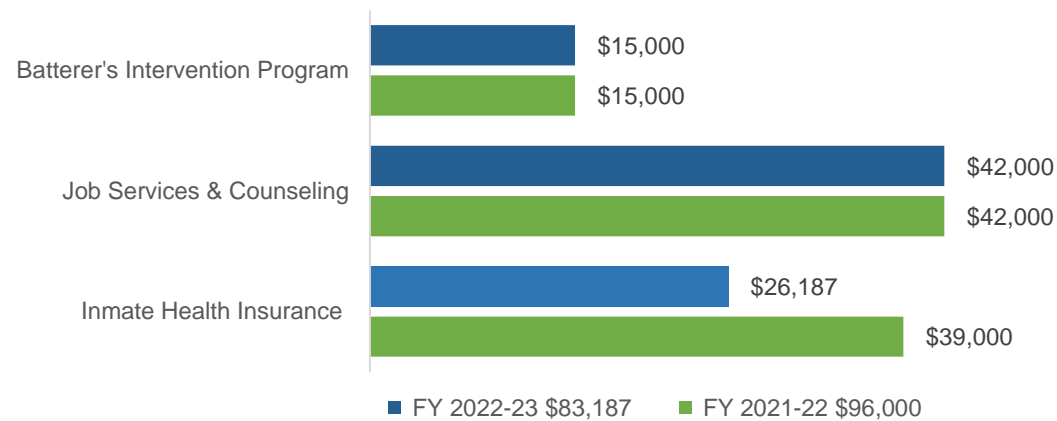
### FY 21-22 and 22-23 Allocations
