The program provides financial literacy, credit repair, rental assistance, and eviction prevention, expanding to a minimum of 10 underserved counties. Outcomes will include 80% completing financial training, 70% securing stable housing, and reduced recidivism. Sustainable through partnerships and diversified funding, the program empowers individuals to rebuild their lives and communities.
2.	<u>Catholic Charities of Santa Clara County</u> Funding Amount: \$ 4,500,000 Region: Coastal County Headquarters: San Jose	Catholic Charities of Santa Clara County (CCSCC), located in San Jose, CA, proposes its Bridge to Reentry Program to expand stabilizing services for those reentering the community from California state prisons. CCSCC plans to build on the infrastructure it developed operating its Warm Handoff reentry program in Cohort 2 to serve 60 new clients annually and add a rental assistance component. We will leverage our relationships with community and system partners to reach and prioritize individuals released to state parole. The program will help participants attain self-sufficiency, reduce crisis, increase housing stability, and improve their overall well-being.
3.	<u>Center For Living And Learning</u> Funding Amount: \$ 2,335,822 Region: Southern County Headquarters: Van Nuys	The proposed program will address barriers to employment, housing, and wraparound services that former state prisoners in the San Fernando Valley and greater Los Angeles area face. We will enroll at least 200 members of the target population to receive peer-led employment services, cognitive behavioral interventions, housing navigation/rental assistance. We will prepare, place, and retain participants in jobs and provide paths to permanent housing, facilitating successful reentry through a continuum of care model that incorporates the core components of Housing First. As an ARG 2 and 3 contractor, CLL has the experience to successfully implement the program.

Case managers offer intensive, wraparound support, helping participants achieve stability through housing, life skills, and cognitive interventions. The program applies the Housing First model, ensuring participants access permanent housing quickly and without preconditions, supported by evidence-based practices to reduce recidivism.
