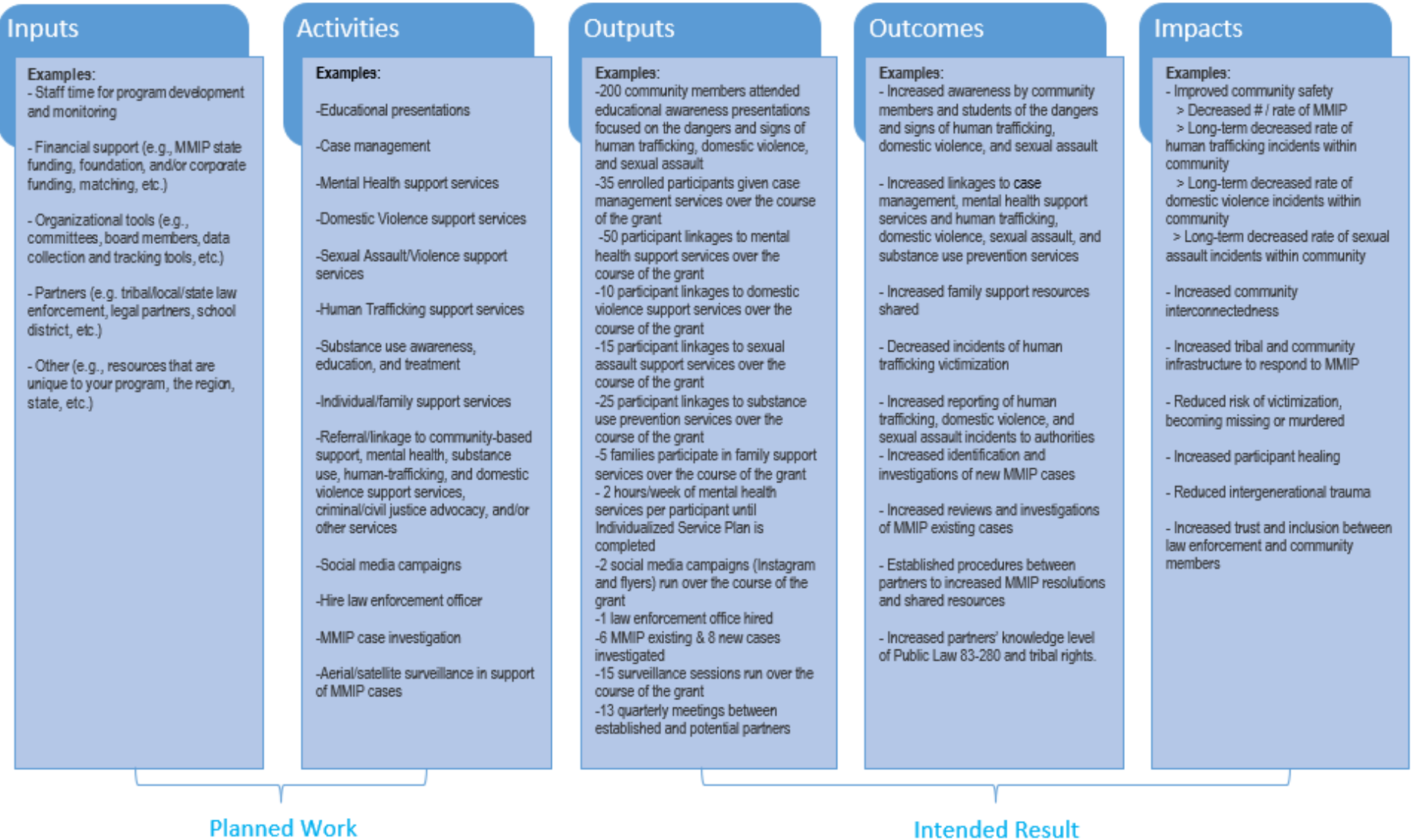
Key Information regarding Final Local Evaluation Report (FLER)

- Prop 47 Cohort 3 funding period
 - September 1, 2022 – June 1, 2026 (no extension)
or
 - September 1, 2022 – December 1, 2026 (6-month extension)
- Due dates:
 - No extension: **June 1, 2026**
 - 6-month extension: **December 1, 2026**
 - Final (Year 3) Recidivism data have the same due dates
- Submit FLERs to: BSCCProp47Evaluator@bscc.ca.gov
- All FLERs will be made public and posted on the BSCC website.
- Information from FLERs may be incorporated into the Prop 47 Cohort 3 statewide report.
- Review Prop 47 Cohort 4 FLERs for ideas – note the quality varies, so review several

Project Background

- Provide information essential to understanding the nature and motivation of the project
- Starting with this section is a good refresher as to why this project was important and the impact you intended it to have on your community
- Your project background was written in your LEP

Current Logic Model



Process Evaluation

- Was the program implemented as intended?
- Results and Discussion
 - Report the data elements you measured for inputs and activities
 - Identify and define data related to implementation of the program
 - Identify and define (if necessary) participant data
 - Identify and define data measured related to services provided
 - Describe analyses conducted, if relevant
 - If any of your goals/objectives were related to the process evaluation what progress was made towards achieving them?
 - Provide a clear interpretation of the results and lessons learned

Outcome Evaluation

- What were the outcomes and impacts of this project?
- Results and Discussion
 - Identify and define outcomes measured
 - Must report recidivism using BSCC definition
 - May also report outcome using a local definition of recidivism (e.g., re-arrest)
 - Describe any analyses of outcome data, if relevant
 - Describe progress made towards achieving goals/objectives related to outcome measures?
 - Provide detailed description of findings as it relates to outcome measures
 - Provide a clear interpretation of the results and lessons learned

Conclusions and Recommendations

- Conclusions and Recommendations
 - Effectiveness of strategies used to reduce recidivism
 - Provide specific recommendations with detailed guidance for what to replicate and/or what not to do
 - Can discuss other outcomes, but primary focus should be on reducing recidivism

Grantee Highlight

- One page highlight from your program that will be included in the statewide report
- May want to include a VERY high-level overview of program to provide context
- Tell a story about your program in one page any way you want
 - Infographic
 - Success story(ies)
 - Program summary with charts or graphs
 - Photos*

Executive Summary

- 2 – 3 page summary of your project
- Should include:
 - Purpose
 - Research design (process and outcome evaluations)
 - Goals and objectives and the extent to which they were achieved
 - Major findings including unintended outcomes (positive and negative)
 - Project accomplishments
 - May want to highlight important data points in a way that captures the readers' attention



For the participants who completed program requirements and indicated **Housing** was a goal, there was a:

- 70% decrease in homelessness.
- 41% increase in participants living independently.
- 68% increase in participants in permanent supportive housing.

Executive Summary

- 2 – 3 page summary of your project
- Should include:
 - Purpose
 - Research design (process and outcome evaluations)
 - Goals and objectives and the extent to which they were achieved
 - Major findings including unintended outcomes (positive and negative)
 - Project accomplishments
 - May want to highlight important data points in a way that captures the readers' attention
 - Challenges encountered and how they were overcome
 - Lessons learned and conclusions

Miscellaneous Information

- The Executive Summary is the only section of your report that most people will read
- The FLER should tell the story of your project
 - Includes the successes and challenges
 - How you overcame the challenges
 - Incorporate examples into your report
- For grantees who plan on including analysis of multiple cohorts
 - Complete the analysis Cohort 3 only first
 - Complete a separate analysis of multiple cohorts
