**Proposition 47 Project Descriptions (in alphabetical order)**

**1. Alameda County Health Care Services Agency**

Project Title: ACPProp47

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The purpose of ACPProp47 is to support residents who are involved in the justice system who have a mental health issue and/or substance use disorder (SUD) that limits one or more of their life activities. Our proposed project expands on the successful implementation of our Prop 47 Cycle I grant, which focused on providing intensive mental health (MH) and substance use disorder (SUD) supports to our highest need reentry population. As Cycle I Prop 47 funding enabled the County to draw down significant match in third party billing, we have been able to institutionalize a large portion of the services supported by the initial grant through other funding sources. As a result, under our Cycle II application we propose to not only supplement existing intensive services, but also include additional prevention/early intervention diversion services to more comprehensively address the diverse needs of our justice impacted County residents.

**2. Butte County Probation Department**

Project Title: Reentry Assistance Program (RAP)

Grant Funds Requested: \$3,024,518

The Butte County RAP provides men and women 18 years and older with an integrated trauma informed wrap around services. The services provided include transitional housing, substance use counseling, mental health counseling, work readiness preparation and effective case management. Services provided to each participant are determined by a full assessment of their risk factors and needs. Butte County Probation Officers develop an Individual Development Plan (IDP) with the participant and collaborate closely with key partners including Tri County Treatment and Butte County Department of Behavioral Health. Services will be provided throughout rural Butte County building capacity and expanding access to critical reentry services.

**3. Compton, City of**

Project Title: Project HOMES (Housing, Mental Health, Employment and Substance Abuse)

Grant Funds Requested: \$3,000,000

The City of Compton will partner with three subcontractors to provide comprehensive re-entry services for eligible clients, offering trauma-informed case management paired with wrap-around services designed to address each individual's unique mental health, SUD, housing and support service needs.

**4. Contra Costa Behavioral Health Services**

Project Title: Contra Costa Forensic Assertive Community Treatment (Coco FACT)

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,936,088

Coco FACT is a Forensic Assertive Community Treatment (FACT) program inclusive of housing support designed to provide comprehensive services to the large number of individuals that our county anticipates will be eligible for pretrial diversion under AB 1810, yet for whom anticipated funding under AB 1810 will be able to support only a small percentage of appropriate diversion candidates in our county. CoCo FACT will provide capacity to treat up to 75 diversion clients at any given time; we anticipate the capacity to divert and treat up to 150 additional individuals over the three-year grant period, leveraging work-flows and administrative infrastructure generated via AB 1810. In addition to providing comprehensive wrap-around mental health treatment, substance abuse treatment and housing support through FACT, the proposed intervention intends to address the multitude of factors contributing to involvement in the criminal justice system through vocational support, trauma treatment and restorative justice principles. It is anticipated that effective treatment of this target population via FACT will reduce time spent in detention, avoid psychiatric visits to emergency rooms, reduce admissions to local and state psychiatric hospitals, increase engagement with mental health and substance abuse treatment, and increase participants' ability to function effectively in the community.

**5. Corning, City of**

Project Title: Tehama County RESTORE Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$3,535,485

The Tehama County RESTORE Program is an adolescent and young adult (ages 12 to 26) diversion program. RESTORE is a tripartite diversion program that links: a) Michigan State's Adolescent Diversion program (ADP); b) mental health treatment; and c) substance abuse treatment through coordinated case management services which links clients and their families to housing, education, and employment services. RESTORE leverages federal, state, regional, and local resources to target arrested, charged with, and/or convicted adolescents with criminal offenses and a history of mental health issues and/or substance use disorders

**6. Corona-Norco Unified School District**

Project Title: Corona-Norco Unified School District's Youth Diversion Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$1,000,000

Our Youth Diversion Program (YDP) will support youth (aged 12 to 21) by providing mental health services, substance use disorder treatment, housing-related assistance, job skills and placement services, case management, mentoring, and legal consultations to our target population in the criminal justice system. Our Prop 47 grant program expands and enhances the existing diversion programs in our community (Youth Diversion Team conducted by the Corona Police Department and the Youth Advisory Team conducted by the Riverside County Sheriff's Department) by hiring a Youth Resource Officer, contracting with Community-Based Organizations, and providing evidence based

interventions to our target population. Funding for our Prop 47 grant program will reduce juvenile recidivism rates, divert juvenile offenders from juvenile correctional institutions, and improve performance in school and employment readiness.

**7. Fairfield, City of**

Project Title: Pathways Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Grant funds will be used to create diversion programming for eligible homeless individuals in Fairfield and Vacaville (as identified by Fairfield Police Homeless Intervention Team and Vacaville Community Response Unit) that would include mental health treatment, temporary housing, substance use disorder treatment, and job skills training for those in the criminal justice system. A coordinated collaboration of community stakeholders have committed skills and resources to ensure the individual's return to the criminal justice system and streets of Fairfield are greatly reduced, if not eliminated by diverting the individual into programming rather than repeated incarceration.

**8. Fresno County Superior Court**

Project Title: Fresno County Justice-Involved Transition Age Youth Initiative

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,994,000

Fresno proposes a comprehensive program for justice-involved young adults, ages 18 through 25, with the goals to reduce recidivism and increase access to community based treatment. Social workers working under the Public Defender, will screen and identify young adults with mental health or substance use treatment needs and connect them to community-based support, including housing and employment opportunities. A network of CBOs will serve participants in rural communities and urban Fresno neighborhoods. Justice partners will launch a restorative justice planning process for low level adult criminal offenses. A local monitoring team will support the CBOs to collect and maintain program data and professors from the Fresno State Criminology Department will provide third-party evaluation services.

**9. Hayward, City of**

Project Title: Hayward Navigation Center Prop 47 Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$999,881

The Hayward Navigation Center Prop 47 Project will provide comprehensive, evidence-based, trauma-informed diversion services through intensive case management/care coordination that wraparound qualified homeless justice-impacted individuals who experience mental illness and/or substance use disorders. Centered on housing stability, the Hayward Police Department, in close partnership with the Hayward Prop 47 Local Advisory Committee, will establish a LEAD diversion program to divert offenders to the services, whereby the individual is "diverted" from standard prosecution and into specialized community-based programming to address their specific needs. Services will include treatment for behavioral health and substance use disorders, soft skills/job training, legal and housing services.

**10. Kern County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services**

Project Title: Home, Health, and Community

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Through the “Home, Health, and Community” program, Kern Behavioral Health & Recovery Services (KBHRS) seeks to implement an approach to address mental health, substance use, physical health, housing and criminogenic needs of individuals released from incarceration. Screenings will be initiated early in the criminal justice process targeting nonviolent, non-serious offenders that will be referred for diversion programs.

**11. Kings County Behavioral Health**

Project Title: Kings County Proposition 47

Grant Funds Requested: \$3,675,563

Kings County Proposition 47 will create three new programs/services for justice involved individuals in Kings County which include: (1) Intensive treatment services, called Full Service Partnership, for up to 20 youth ages 16 - 24 at any time (2) Housing support services including rental assistance, landlord relations, and housing navigation for a minimum of 20 individuals; (3) Reentry services which will offer in custody screening up to 30 days pre-release at the jail and juvenile facility and linkages post release.

**12. Long Beach, City of, Department of Health & Human Services**

Project Title: Long Beach Reentry Network

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,999,900

The City of Long Beach, Department of Health and Human Services aims to use Proposition 47 funds to support diversion programming, mental health services, and substance use disorder treatment for high frequency utilizers of the criminal justice system.

**13. Los Angeles City Attorney's Office**

Project Title: LA DOOR (Diversion Outreach & Opportunities for Recovery)

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The Los Angeles City Attorney's Office seeks to expand its transformative LA DOOR (Diversion Outreach and Opportunities for Recovery) model to reach areas in Central and Downtown Los Angeles most in need of robust Proposition 47 services. LA DOOR expansion will provide the following services to a minimum of 750 participants during the grant cycle: 1) peer-led mobile social services consistently delivered to five hotspot locations with high numbers of individuals experiencing homelessness, substance dependence, and mental illness, 2) expansion of pre-arrest diversion on Proposition 47 drug possession arrests to include Central, Rampart, and Newton LAPD divisions where these arrest numbers are highest, and 3) proactive removal of participant legal barriers through collaborative City Attorney and Public Defender partnerships. With LA DOOR expansion, the City Attorney's Office continues to demonstrate commitment to advancing opportunities for treating addiction and mental illness through community health approaches rather than relying solely on traditional prosecution methods.

**14. Los Angeles County Department of Health Services, Office of Diversion & Reentry**

Project Title: Proposition 47 – Intensive Case Management Services, Employment Services, Interim Housing & Civic Engagement for People in the Criminal Justice System  
Grant Funds Requested: \$18,616,627

The Los Angeles County Department of Health Services Office of Diversion and Reentry will expand reentry-focused intensive case management, housing, and wrap-around services as well as create sector-based employment services and promote civic engagement to improve health and employment outcomes and reduce recidivism among justice involved individuals with mild to moderate substance use and mental health disorders.

**15. Los Angeles Mayor's Office of Economic Opportunity, Office of Reentry**

Project Title: Project imPACT & DJJ iHART  
Grant Funds Requested: \$5,999,304

Project imPACT is a year-long program that serves justice-affected individuals seeking employment. While enrolled in the program, program Fellows will receive a personalized risk/needs assessment, cohort-based cognitive-behavioral therapy curriculum, ongoing support provided by a peer mentor ("Peer Navigator"), access to legal services provided by a lawyer ("Attorney"), and ongoing behavioral therapy by a licensed therapist ("Counselor"). A client's "PACTeam", which consists of his/her Peer Navigator, Attorney, and Counselor, will work together to stabilize the participant, eliminate barriers, and increase his/her ability to obtain and retain employment. Project imPACT will assess approximately Four Hundred and Twenty (420) potential Fellows per year, of which Two Hundred (200) will be granted services.

The Department of Juvenile Justice Intensive Hope and Redemption Team (DJJ iHART) is a partnership between the Mayor's Office of Reentry ("MORE") and Anti-Recidivism Coalition (ARC), a community-based organization leading reentry efforts in Los Angeles. With ARC's programmatic expertise, this partnership will employ a transformative mentor program for Los Angeles residents, with an in-reach component at the Ventura Youth Correctional Facility (VYCF) and continuing community-based services post-release. The program will utilize a transformative mentor model, in which all mentors have both lived experience relevant to the youth as well as professional training. Upon exiting DJJ, participating L.A. City youthful offenders will have access to mental health services, substance abuse treatment, case management, job skills training, and legal aid through ARC. DJJ iHART will serve Forty to Fifty (40 -50) L.A.-based youthful offenders per year.

**16. Los Angeles Police Department**

Project Title: Diversion through Individual, Relationship, and Community (D-IRC) Mentoring Project  
Grant Funds Requested: \$3,024,849

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) is proposing to partner with Youth Mentoring Connection to use the Proposition 47 Grant Program funds to initiate the Diversion through Individual, Relationship, and Community (D-IRC) Mentoring Project. The D-IRC

Mentoring Project is a diversion program that will target youth in the criminal justice system, ages 14-17, with evidence of mental health or addiction disorder. The D-IRC Mentoring Project is projected to reduce recidivism by 33% and demonstrate an 80% success rate of youth participants' enrollment in higher education/jobs and participation in positive youth development activities. The D-IRC Mentoring Program will involve directed Individual Wellness Plans, Wrap Around Case Management, the use of national mentoring models, formal and informal community and family support and services, Hazelden Living in Balance Co-occurring Disorders Curricula, and mentoring that follows Hazelden's Matrix Model Criminal Justice Setting. It is anticipated that the program will engage 315 youth participants.

**17. Marin County Health & Human Services**

Project Title: Prop 27 Cohort 2

Grant Funds Requested: \$999,965

Marin County will add care coordination services for Criminal Justice involved adults by hiring Recovery Coaches. Efforts will be made to engage underserved Spanish speakers and Transitional Age Youth. Grant funds will also be used for vocational training and housing for unemployed or homeless participants. Leveraged funding and in-kind resources will be provided by the county's system of care and by CBOs on contract with the county.

**18. Mariposa County Health & Human Services Agency**

Project Title: Mariposa Heritage House Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$863,508

Mariposa County Proposition 47 Project aims to reduce recidivism among offenders with mental illness and substance use disorders through increased screening/assessment, referrals, case management, transportation and housing supports for this population.

**19. Monterey County Health Department, Behavioral Health Bureau**

Project Title: Continuing the Path to Healing and Transformation Through Collaborative Partnerships

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Monterey County will dedicate Prop 47 funds to continue the substance use treatment services implemented under Cohort One. We propose to continue supportive services that include: employment support, legal support and reclassification filing. We propose to add a Mental Health Diversion Court and Housing related services, sober living environments and an outreach specialist.

**20. Nevada County Department of Behavioral Health**

Project Title: Prop 47 Homeless & Justice Involved Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$1,000,000

The Nevada County Behavioral Health Department, and its dedicated community service partners, will utilize Prop 47 funding to expand and enhance the existing Homeless Outreach and Medical Engagement (HOME) Team. The Team will meet the needs of a

traditionally service resistant cohort of justice involved, homeless individuals who present with a myriad of untreated behavioral health and physical health needs. The overarching goal of the Project is to reduce recidivism and conserve community resources by diverting this population from jail into mental health and substance use disorder (SUD) treatment, with targeted housing supports. Specific strategies the mobile Team will utilize include: homeless outreach, building rapport through Motivational Interviewing and other engagement strategies; connecting individuals to trauma informed mental health services; and providing screenings and access to substance use disorder assessments and treatment. In addition, this grant will fund new low barrier and sober housing supports, as well as rental assistance which will allow the Team to quickly link individuals to stable living environments and legal support.

**21. Orange County Health Care Agency**

Project Title: Community of Hope: Gateway to Successful Reentry

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The program serves as a safety net and gateway to successful reentry in Orange County for individuals with substance use and/or mild-moderate mental health disorders who are high risk to recidivate. The program provides jail in-reach services, sanctuary for those being released from jail at night, and a spectrum of treatment, housing, and supportive services provided in the community by individuals with specialized knowledge and training in meeting the needs of the reentry population. The continuum of supportive housing options will be expanded for this reentry population. Trainings will be provided to existing and prospective service and housing providers on principles of trauma, recovery, and reentry needs, in order to build a system of integrated services that address the needs of formerly incarcerated individuals.

**22. Pasadena Police Department**

Project Title: Vision 20/20 Workforce Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,109,567

The proposed Vision 20/20 Workforce Project will provide new and expanded comprehensive reentry services to constituents in Pasadena and Altadena. Services will include new substance abuse and mental health disorder treatment in tandem with workforce development services. Services are designed to help low income and underserved formerly incarcerated individuals attain meaningful, living wage employment.

**23. Pasadena Unified School District**

Project Title: Pasadena Intervention and Directional Alternative Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$999,528

Pasadena Unified School District (PUSD) has a significant need for funding for our Pasadena Intervention and Directional Alternatives (PIDA) Prop 47 grant program to expand capacity to effectively meet the needs of juveniles in the criminal justice system. PUSD will use grant funds to support mental health services; substance use disorder treatment; diversion programs that include mentoring, case management, and alternatives to adjudication through the juvenile court system; supportive services for

foster and homeless youth, which include transitional housing; job skills training, certification and placement; and evidence-based curriculum Why Try? and Aggression Replacement Training.

**24. Placer County Health and Human Services**

Project Title: ACTION Team: Promoting Community Health and Safety

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The Placer County Proposition 47 Action Team (AT) Cohort 2 will expand and enhance the AT Cohort 1 program to serve all ages, including juveniles and across all regions of the county. The expanded AT will include additional bilingual, bicultural staff to deliver culturally competent, strengths-based, individual and family driven services. Community Recovery Resources (CoRR) is the organizational provider that implemented the Cohort 1 AT by developing community-based solutions for reducing recidivism through principles of restorative justice and offering MH and SUD treatment services combined with diversion activities. AT is an integrated and collaborative multidisciplinary team that combines Probation Officers, mental health and substance use disorder treatment, Peer, Family, and Transition Age Youth advocates, and housing and vocational coordinators to provide immediate, timely, individualized integrated case planning and ongoing services to meet the needs of each member and their family.

**25. Plumas County District Attorney's Office**

Project Title: Plumas County Proposition 47 Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$1,000,000

To address systems gaps identified and continue and sustain a Pretrial Diversion Program combined with mental health, substance use disorder treatment, housing and community-based supportive services including life and job skills training and intensive case management for participants in the Plumas County criminal justice system.

**26. Riverside University Health System-Behavioral Health**

Project Title: Continued Integrated Care Behavioral Health Full Service Partnership Programs with the Addition of Housing support and Sober Living Homes

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Riverside University Health System-Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH) is seeking to extend funding for contracted Integrated Care FSPs in underserved regions, as well as expand services to include adjunct housing support in the form of Sober Living Environments, Emergency Housing, and other supportive housing. Additionally, RUHS-BH seeks to expand the target population of the grant funding in Riverside County to include those who frequently cycle in and out of jail.

**27. Sacramento County Department of Health Services, Division of Behavioral Health Services**

Project Title: Sacramento County Outpatient Forensic Clinic and Resource Center

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000



Increase mental health and/or co-occurring treatment capacity by creating a new forensic outpatient clinic and resource center which will be dually certified for mental health Medi-Cal and SUD Drug Medi-Cal funded services targeting adults (18 years and older) who are living with mental illness and/or co-occurring substance use disorders and who are involved with the criminal justice system (have been arrested, charged and/or convicted of a misdemeanor or felony and agree to participation).

**28. Sacramento County Sheriff's Department**

Project Title: Proposition 47 Grant Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$4,781,121

Sacramento Sheriff's Office Reentry Services seeks Proposition 47 Grant Program support to address the mental health, substance use, and housing needs of its criminal justice involved population. Reentry Services provides in-custody treatment, education, and vocational programming to offenders incarcerated at Sacramento County's two jail facilities, the Main Jail and Rio Cosumnes Correctional Center. Reentry Services participants are supported during their in-custody and post-release journey by an assigned Reentry Specialist. Participants receive individualized case planning, exit planning, and Reentry Specialist support for up to one-year post-release.

Sacramento Sheriff's Office's Reentry Services recognizes the mental health and post-release services needs of its population and seeks to fill these gaps in service. Reentry Services plans to utilize Proposition 47 Grant Program funds to provide in-custody co-occurring treatment to eligible participants in need of mental health and substance use disorder treatment, contract with one or more local community providers to offer post release co-occurring residential and outpatient opportunities to its population, contract with one or more community providers to secure clean and sober residential programs to those exiting incarceration in need of continued treatment, and contract with one or more community providers to secure transitional housing for program participants facing homelessness upon release from custody.

**29. San Bernardino County Department of Behavioral Health**

Project Title: Project ORO - Options, Resources and Opportunities

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Project ORO aims to address the unique and various needs of the target population of inmates who need mental health and substance recovery services. The project will build upon current recidivism response programs, work with existing contracted partners, engage the Local Advisory Committee, and contract with certain pre-qualified providers, to provide community-based supportive services based on assessed needs. Through these partnerships and the leveraging of funds, Project ORO is expected to enhance existing county programming by serving an underserved population. Services will be provided by several local government agencies and the community based organizations (CBOs). It is anticipated that this project will serve 500 individuals by identifying and addressing the complex needs at the root of criminogenic behavior through wraparound evidence-based services, including but not limited to, mental health services, substance used disorder services, diversion services, housing, academic/vocational training, employment services, civil legal services, etc.

**30. San Francisco Department of Public Health**

Project Title: Supporting Treatment & Reducing Recidivism (STARR)

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The STARR program is designed to meet one of the most critical community care needs in San Francisco - providing additional residential treatment beds, outpatient case management, and wraparound support services for criminal justice-involved adults with co-occurring substance use disorder and mental health issues. The overall goal is to reduce incarceration and recidivism by bolstering city-wide initiatives focused on jail diversion, recovery, and community reentry.

**31. San Joaquin County Behavioral Health Services**

Project Title: Adult Residential Treatment Services (ARTS) Project

Grant Funds Requested: \$2,840,250

The San Joaquin County Behavioral Health Services program will provide 18-24 months of ARTS within a licensed social rehabilitation facility for 16-24 homeless seriously mentally ill diversion clients with co-occurring disorders that are chronic re-offenders.

**32. San Luis Obispo County Behavioral Health Department, Drug and Alcohol Services Division**

Project Title: Mental Health Diversion Transitional Housing and Supportive Services

Grant Funds Requested: \$1,000,000

The County of San Luis Obispo plans to implement a Mental Health Diversion program which includes mental health treatment, intensive case management, psychiatric services, and substance use disorder treatment. This Prop 47 funding proposal focuses on transitional housing with other community-based supportive services for individuals in the Mental Health Diversion program.

**33. Santa Ana Unified School District**

Project Title: Conexiones (translates to Connections)

Grant Funds Requested: \$2,756,857

The Santa Ana Unified School District will lead a collaborative effort to provide mental health, substance use disorder treatment, diversion, housing assistance, and job development at eight target schools sites in the City of Santa Ana.

**34. Santa Barbara County Office of the Public Defender**

Project Title: Crisis Intervention, Diversion and Support (CIDS) Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,998,511

The CIDS Program aims to reduce criminal justice system involvement for the target population by providing crisis intervention directed to individuals at three main points of entry: field law enforcement contact (arrest), jail booking, and prior to arraignment. CIDS will intervene with individuals in a mental health crisis, divert these individuals to trauma-informed, community-based wraparound services as an alternative to arrest and/or jail,

and provide comprehensive behavioral health and case management support, including housing assistance, to those within and exiting the criminal justice system in order to reduce recidivism and re-entry.

**35. Santa Clara County Behavioral Health Services Department**

Project Title: Santa Clara County Prop 47

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,999,171

The Santa Clara County Proposition 47 Project (SCCP47) will fill gaps in substance use treatment and mental health treatment for justice-involved individuals with moderate-severe or persistent mental illness and co-occurring disorders. Specifically, SCCP47 will: 1) increase slots for outpatient co-occurring treatment; 2) increase slots for outpatient substance use treatment; and 3) expand transitional housing units (THU) for individuals participating in one of the above outpatient treatment programs. In addition, SCCP47 will fund housing case managers who will provide housing assessment, navigation, and case management. Treatment programs will facilitate referrals to other community-based services as appropriate, including job readiness and transitional employment services using leveraged funds from the Office of Reentry Services.

**36. Santa Cruz County Probation Department**

Project Title: Coordinated Access for Empowering Success (CAFES)

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,998,164

The CAFES project, guided by core values of dignity, integrity and trust, proposes a trauma-informed, evidenced-based, multi-agency continuum of care model to expand and enhance services for underserved populations, focusing on first-time offenders, those who have been ruled out of mental health treatment services and those who do not receive funding through AB109. The CAFES project will target a significant gap in Santa Cruz County's services, providing diversion opportunities and/or access to mental health and substance use treatment, case management, and housing support to justice-involved individuals. Integral to this project is the collaboration of multiple community-based organizations, probation, court partners, and county mental health.

**37. Shasta County Probation Department**

Project Title: Misdemeanor Community Engagement

Grant Funds Requested: \$1,000,000

This Misdemeanor Community Engagement Program will focus on engaging offenders who have been charged with misdemeanor charges and have substance abuse and or mental health disorders. A Probation Assistant and a local Community Based Organization will work together with other criminal justice partners to identify offenders who need additional engagement, case management, and treatment services.

**38. Siskiyou County Health & Human Services Agency**

Project Title: Siskiyou Revive Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$875,897

The Siskiyou Revive Program will provide temporary supported housing for criminally

involved adults who are homeless and have a mental illness and/or substance use disorder. Revive will use evidence-based practices to provide housing, intensive case management, mental health and substance use treatment, diversion support, job readiness training, basic life skills development, and as appropriate, any other services to foster wellness and reduce recidivism.

**39. Sonoma County Department of Health Services-Behavioral Health Division**

Project Title: County of Sonoma Prop 47 Initiative

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

Sonoma County faces a significant need for services for individuals in the criminal justice system who have mental health and substance use disorders. The proposed project will provide mental health and substance use disorder treatment, along with case management and care coordination to ensure that participants are accessing appropriate services. Additional services will include community based transitional housing for people with mental health and substance use disorders and longer term supportive housing and workforce services designed to help participants stabilize their lives and return to the community.

**40. Trinity County Behavioral Health**

Project Title: I-CAN Mental Health Diversion Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$2,503,660

The Trinity County Behavioral Health Department will enhance access to community-based, culturally competent mental health services and peer respite services, expand substance use disorder treatment, and develop new reentry focused intensive case management, housing, employment and wrap-around services. The program will use evidence-based interventions to ensure that people living with, or at risk of behavioral health conditions, improve overall health outcomes and reduce recidivism among justice involved youth and adults with mild to moderate mental health and substance dependency disorders. Services shall include mental health services provided by Behavioral Health, SUD treatment services provided by Public Health, employment services provided by Health & Human Services and housing and related supportive services provided by community-based organizations.

**41. Tulare County Health & Human Services Agency**

Project Title: Fresh Start Diversion Program

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,218,759

Tulare County Health and Human Services Agency (TCHHSA) is requesting funding to initiate, implement and expand services in order to reduce the number of individuals incarcerated or involved in the criminal justice system who have a mental health issue and/or substance use disorder (SUDs). By utilizing this grant funding opportunity, Tulare County will be able to create a new initiative called the "Fresh Start Diversion" program that will address gaps in services with a focus on the mild to moderate range of mental health diagnosis. The program will provide a Multi-Disciplinary Team model to provide direct mental health services, substance use disorder treatment, and housing support.

Grant funds will also be utilized to expand the Mental Health/Police Department partnership to reduce criminal justice involvement within the homeless population.

**42. Ventura County Public Defender's Office**

Project Title: Project Early Impact

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

The proposed project - Project Early Impact - will maximize alternatives to incarceration and interventions for Ventura County misdemeanants who are identified with mental health and/or substance abuse needs. Eligible out of custody clients will be provided with case management services and individualized treatment plan driven mental health, substance abuse, and related (e.g. housing, medication management, daily living skills, etc.) services.

**43. Yolo County Health & Human Services Agency**

Project Title: The Self-Sufficiency Project (SSP)

Grant Funds Requested: \$5,974,893

The Yolo County Self-Sufficiency Project proposes to use Proposition 47 grant funds to provide restorative justice diversion and trauma-informed wrap-around care to the following target population. Individuals with a mental health and/or substance use condition who are currently experiencing homelessness or who have a recent history of homelessness, and who (1) have a new misdemeanor or low-level felony case, or (2) are currently on Probation, Mandatory Supervision or Post Release Community Supervision with a new law violation or technical violation of their supervision. The overall aim of the SSP will be to fully integrate participants into their community through promoting and supporting self-sufficiency and decreased recidivism, thereby improving participants' quality of life.
