#### **ORTVP FUNDING**

The Organized Retail Theft Vertical Prosecution Grant Program was established in The State Budget Act of 2022 (Assembly Bill 178, Chapter 45, Statutes of 2022). Funding is available to California District Attorneys for the purpose of addressing increased levels of retail theft property crimes by using a vertical prosecution model.

- Total Funding: \$28,500,000
  - October 1, 2023 JUNE 1, 2027

#### **ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES**

Grant funds must be used to employ a vertical prosecution model, and to dedicate at least one deputy district attorney & one district attorney investigator whose primary role is the investigation and prosecution of organized retail theft crimes. In addition, applicants will be required to provide the following data to the BSCC:

- Annual data on the number of organized retail theft cases filed by that county,
- Number of organized retail theft convictions obtained, and the sentences imposed for those convicted of organized retail theft in that county.
- Number of instances where vertical prosecution was used to obtain those convictions and the sentences imposed.
- Number of theft-related property crimes that were charged overall in the jurisdiction that did not use the vertical prosecution model and the resulting number of convictions.
