

# Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act - Youthful Offender Block Grant 2019 Expenditure and Data Report Due Date: October 1, 2019

On or before October 1, 2019, each county is required to submit to the Board of State & Community Corrections (BSCC) a report on its Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) and Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) programs during the preceding year. For JJCPA this requirement can be found at Government Code (GC) Section 30061(b)(4)(C) and for YOBG it can be found at Welfare & Institutions Code Section (WIC) 1961(c). These code sections both call for a consolidated report format that includes a description of the programs and other activities supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds, an accounting of all JJCPA and YOBG expenditures during the prior fiscal year, and countywide juvenile justice trend data.

Prior to submitting this report save the file using the following naming convention: "(County Name) 2019 JJCPA-YOBG Report." For example, Yuba County would name its file "Yuba 2019 JJCPA-YOBG Report".

Provide a summary description or analysis, based on available information, of how the programs, placements, services, strategies or system enhancements funded by JJCPA-YOBG have, or may have, contributed to, or influenced, the juvenile justice data trends identified in this report.

Trend analysis of report one shows a variety of notable reductions including an 8% drop in Diversions and an 18.5% drop in petitions filed as well as a significant increase of 654 WIC informal dispositions from probation (from 0 in 2018 to 25 in 2019).

The same analysis of report number three shows an approximate 5% decline in court ordered informal probation periods (per 654.2 WIC), an approximate 23% reduction of formal probation without wardship (per 725 WIC) dispositions, an approximate 24% reduction in formal wardship probation dispositions (per 602 WIC) and an increase of approximately 13 % in Court Deferred Entry of Judgement (DEJ) dispositions. Wardship placements to either the home, secure county facility or other private facilities experienced an overall reduction of approximately 24%. Finally, technical violations of probation filed with the Court experienced a reduction of approximately 16%.

Lastly an analysis of the arrest report tab report shows an increase of approximately 11% in felony arrests, a reduction of approximately 18.5 % in misdemeanor arrest and a reduction of approximately 28% in status arrests. Overall arrests reflected a reduction of approximately 18.5%.

The data measured in each these reported categories from 2018 to 2019 indicates significant reductions in almost all categories that were measured. It clearly suggests that the Probation Agencies' early intervention efforts and an increase of services to at risk youth has had a measurable impact on reducing everything from truancy, to juvenle arrests, to Court involvement (for both new offenses and violations probation supervision terms) and confinement in juvenile detention and commitment facilities. Services and programs such as the Evening Reporting Center (ERC), Truancy Habits Reduced Increases Vital Education (THRIVE), the Repeat Offender Prevention Program (ROPP), the Transformation Works program, and the Early Intervention Program along with strong collaborative efforts with schools and community based organizations have coalesced into a cohesive and successful approach to reduce juvenile crime with an emphasis on prevention and detention alternatives.

The Evening Reporting Centers (ERCs) are utilized to address the need for community-based alternatives to detention and to assist in the reduction of minority youth admissions into the Juvenile Facilities. There are currently three ERCs in the County of Ventura. The ERCs serve youth ages 12 ½ to 18. Approximately 100 unduplicated youth are served per year, and the youth attend the ERC program 20-45 business days. The ERCs utilizes evidence-based programming with the intent to build positive personal development and professional skills among participants (i.e. positive self-identify, hope about one's future, educational, vocational, social, emotional, and cultural competencies, community and civic involvement, exposure to a positive foundation for change and values enabling one to develop positive relationships with others). The programmatic goals include: Reduce recidivism; promote and implement positive youth development; track youth who successfully complete program and continue to attend the ERCs; and enhance public safety and promote and increase academic success, character, citizenship, and healthy lifestyles. The ERCs are socially and environmentally safe facilities for the youth to attend. The programs are also based upon physical, emotional, cultural, and social needs, and offered in a non-competitive environment that encourages skill development, self-esteem, and acceptance. It also reinforces positive social values that benefit the community.

For the

2018/2019 year, 51 youth were referred to the ERC (location #1). 63% of youth who have participated in the program have graduated from it. 72% of the youth referred to the program have continued to attend.

For the 2018/2019 year, 17 youth were referred to the ERC (location #2). 30% of youth who have participated in the program have graduated from it. 88% of those youth referred to the program have continued to attend.

For the 2018/2019 year, 25 youth were referred to the ERC (location #3). 59% of youth who have participated in the program have graduated from it. 79% of those youth referred to the program have continued to attend.

The main barrier encountered by the ERCs is obtaining referrals from Probation, and the Probation Officers collaborating with ERC personnel to ensure youth are held accountable for completing the ordered days in a timely fashion. Additionally, many youth in the service area of the #2 ERC do not feel comfortable having to travel to the neighboring city to participate in the program.

THRIVE is a collaborative effort between the Ventura County District Attorney's Office, Ventura County Public Defender's Office, Ventura County Probation Agency, Ventura County Public Health, and the School Attendance Review Boards (SARB). Habitual truants meet with school officials and county prosecutors who strategize ways to improve class attendance. Appropriate remedial and community referral services are made available during the SARB meetings based on the student's issue (i.e. homelessness, medical needs, transportation, etc.). Additionally, parents and students may be referred to a Public Health nurse (PHN) to determine if there are medical reasons for the student being truant. If these services and efforts prove ineffective, prosecutors may utilize formal court sanctions to hold truants and their parents accountable.

The THRIVE program provides truancy intervention for students between the ages of 6 to 18 from 13 Ventura County School Districts, which includes 30 individual school/district sites. During the 2018-2019 school year, there were 1,525 students served throughout the county and a total of 3,002 THRIVE student meetings were held. Caseload capacity is unrestricted. The program is evidence-based and it involves development of a plan unique to the family to help the student combat truancy and attend school on a regular basis. An improvement in attendance is the goal of this truancy program. A significant barrier to the THRIVE program is parent participation. In the 2018-2019 school year, a total of 327 citations were issued to students and/or their parents for violations of the Education or Penal Code. Court sanctions include monetary fines, community service and probation terms. The most influential sanction for high school students is the loss or delay of a driver's license or work permit.

Before the intervention of THRIVE, students were attending school at a rate of 76.5%. After THRIVE intervention, attendance jumped to 83.4%. The unexcused absences dropped significantly after THRIVE intervention from 17.7% to 12.3%. Both of these educational outcomes demonstrate the importance and the effectiveness of the THRIVE program. The THRIVE PHNs provide in home comprehensive nursing assessments to families with students identified as at risk for truancy court through SARB and probation. The nurses assess families for biological, psychological, and social needs by using the nursing process (assessment, diagnosis, plan, interventions and outcomes, and evaluation). They also provide families with the resources to assist them with meeting the SARB agreements, and they conduct home or office/school visits. 156 cases were referred to the THRIVE PHNs. From those cases 110 families that accepted PHN services, one or more members of the family was assisted. 87% of opened family cases (96 out 110) met their outcomes of not receiving a citation.

THe Repeat Offender Prevention Program (ROPP) is an intensive, comprehensive multi-disciplinary program that provides services during the fiscal year for up to 100 first time formal wards, Informal probationers, and DEJ youth who are 15.5 years or younger at time of declaration of wardship or placement on probation, and who demonstrate at least three of four risk factors associated with chronic delinquency. The ROPP team is comprised of three intensive supervision probation officers, two Marriage and Family Therapist, a Substance Abuse counselor, three Youth Advocates and a Reading Specialist. The program is guided by evidence-based practices, and the ROPP team meets weekly to discuss the cases.

The primary objective of ROPP is to provide early identification and services to potential high risk repeat youth offenders. A few of the program's broadly defined objectives include breaking the patterns of delinquency, antisocial behavior and domestic violence, by providing services before the youth become entrenched in the juvenile justice system.

The target population is known as the "8% problem"; youth who are identified as having specific characteristics which make them a high risk for re-offending. The majority of the chronic recidivists are an 8% group with the following characteristics:

- 1. 15.5 years of age or younger at the time of their initial case disposition
- 2. Declared wards of the Court at their initial system referral
- 3. Found to have significantly more problems in four composite areas: a) Significant family problems such as domestic violence, child abuse and family criminality; b) School attendance or performance problems; c) Drug and/or alcohol use; and d) Pre-Delinguent behaviors such as gangs, runaway, stealing.

It was found that chronic juvenile offenders have a significantly higher rate of incarceration and recidivism. More than half of the families of high risk youth have significant problems impeding their ability to provide adequate supervision, structure, or support to their children. Youth are reviewed periodically throughout the time spent in the program. The length of the program is open ended and based on the stability of the family and the sufficiency to which the identified risk factors have been addressed.

For the 2018/2019 fiscal year, 112 youth were assigned to ROPP.

Enrichment programming offers an array of services to youth in the facility that focus on continuing education, career and technology training, life skills, cultural arts and diversity, and cultural awareness. Programs include broadcast journalism, Paxton/Patterson Building Skills (introductory construction courses), landscaping and horticulture skills, poetry, origami, screen printing, Hi-Set testing (formerly GED), music and art lessons, sculpture, dance, exercise, community service activities, and equine based group therapy. A library will also soon be available to the youth.

The program also offers two separate canine programs that are managed in a multiagency collaborative effort with a community based organization. The first is a therapy dog program, in which certified therapy dogs from two separate community organizations (Love on a Leash and Therapy Dogs International) visit the juvenile facilities up to twice weekly to provide emotional support to the youth.

The second is a canine care and basic dog obedience dog training program, with dogs that reside full-time in the facility called "Pawsitive Steps." This program is a multi-agency collaboration with the Canine Animal Rescue League (C.A.R.L.), Ventura County Animal Shelter, Behavioral Health and Ventura County Office of Education to provide training, counseling, and education to the youth working with the selected dogs. With the assistance of a certified trainer this program teaches youth how to properly care for and train a shelter dog and prepare it to pass a series of tests for cetification in basic caninie obedieience. Once the 12 to 16 week training is complete, the youth assist in preparing the dog for adoption into the community. Combined with the physical training and care of the dogs, there are additional program components consisting of Restorative Justice through Behavioral Health, humane education and career pathways. The youth will earn elective school credits during their participation. This program gives the youth the opportunity to give back to their community; enhance their social, educational and vocational skills; and promote their sense of responsibility, kindness and compassion.

Probation will continue to engage in community outreach, provide re-entry services and enhanced dental/vision

services to the youth.
