

# Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding (CESF)

Term: March 31, 2021 - January 31, 2022

## Proposal Abstracts (in alphabetical order)

### 1. County of Alameda

**\$1,121,503.18**

**Lead Agency:** Alameda County Sheriff's Office

**Project Title:** Operation COVID Recovery

The Alameda County Sheriff's Office will use grant funds to open four vacant housing units at Santa Rita Jail, which will enhance the ability to quarantine inmates, spread the inmate population, and slow the spread of COVID-19. Additionally, the County will use this funding to facilitate the delivery of medical services and vaccinations for inmates at Santa Rita Jail. There are no existing funds to accomplish these tasks, therefore, a significant amount of the CESF Grant funding will be used to increase jail staffing on an overtime basis.

21.4% of the CESF Funding will be directed to a CBO, Alameda County Sheriff's Activities League, to enhance their Dig Deep Farms Operation. This will increase community involvement in the food system, increase access to health food, create jobs (re-entry), and improve the quality of life for low income residents in the County.

### 2. County of Butte

**\$291,542.54**

**Lead Agency:** Butte County Probation Department

**Project Title:** Safe Re-Entry

The Butte County Probation Department will serve as the Lead Public Agency coordinating all grant activities while implementing the safe re-entry program. The coronavirus is forcing staff, where telework is possible, to work from home. To supervise clients, staff must have the necessary telecommute supplies at home. The program will include increasing the ability for staff to telecommute, therefore reducing the on-site footprint to prevent the spread of coronavirus. In addition, the program will provide clients residing in clean and sober living environments affected by the coronavirus with temporary rent assistance.

Personal Protective Equipment is a critical component in reducing the spread of coronavirus. The County is requesting funding to purchase PPE for staff and clients. County Emergency Response Training for staff is requested to prepare for coronavirus outbreaks. Community-Based Organizations will receive assistance to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus.

### 3. Contra Costa County

**\$1,547,649.38**

**Lead Agency:** Contra Costa County Office of the Sheriff

**Project Title:** Contra Costa COVID Response

Contra Costa County has an aggressive infection control plan in place to minimize the spread of the COVID within the detention facilities; however, the two main facilities were designed long before the current pandemic. There are several areas that can be addressed to better control viral spread long term. The project includes improvements to the intake area, enhancement of staff workstations on the inmate housing units, implementing the clean air system for West County Detention Facility, purchase of new, antimicrobial mattresses, and viral barriers in the highly used inmate telephone areas. These upgrades will allow for improved social distancing and minimize the opportunity for COVID to spread.

The project will also include work with outside partner(s) to have a warm hand-off with post incarcerated individuals and a COVID prevention kit upon release from the detention facilities.

**4. Fresno County** **\$892,345.82**

**Lead Agency:** Probation Department  
**Project Title:** Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program

CESF funding will: 1.) provide the new Fresno County Sheriff's Communications Center with new dispatch style consoles and office furniture to allow for social distancing and reduce the spread of coronavirus 2.) support the Marjaree Mason Center which provides services to victims of domestic violence and has seen an increase in cases due to the coronavirus 3.) aide the central California Food Bank in the fight against hunger and feed households impacted by the coronavirus 4.) provide the Fresno County Probation Department Staff i.e. Deputy Probation Officers (DPO) and Juvenile Correctional Officers (JCO) with a virtual training simulator so training sessions are no longer postponed or compromised due to the needed coronavirus precautions such as social distancing and limiting number of individuals in a space 5.) provide the Fresno County Juvenile Justice Campus (Juvenile Hall) with an ultraviolet Air Purification System to help protect the health and safety of youth and staff alike from the coronavirus.

**5. Humboldt County** **\$146,830**

**Lead Agency:** Humboldt County Sheriff's Office  
**Project Title:** Humboldt County Sheriff's Prevention, Preparation, and Response to the Coronavirus Pandemic

The Coronavirus pandemic has upended standard operating procedure by limiting the way staff can safely interact with each other and the public they serve. The modifications are time-sensitive and result in costs that were not anticipated when the department's budget was drafted.

The CESF Grant funds will be used to purchase necessary equipment for ongoing law enforcement and community response activities in a safe and prudent manner. Most of the CESF Grant allocation, approximately \$117,000 will be used to purchase about 40 MDTs or mobile data terminals, laptops, monitors, cases, cords, mice, battery backups, docking stations, and other peripherals items for effective use. These Mobile Data Terminals can be used in vehicles, in the home, or other safe areas limiting the need to be in more populated areas or in close quarters when completing essential functions. Like the Deputies, Corrections

staff have a limited supply of personal computers and often must share resources in small quarters. The use of laptops to perform administrative tasks will be one more step in limiting unnecessary contact.

## 6. Imperial County

**\$250,267.88**

**Lead Agency:** Imperial County's Sheriff's Office  
**Project Title:** Coronavirus Emergency Program

The Imperial County Sheriff's Office, in an effort to respond, prevent, prepare and combat the coronavirus pandemic emergency, will implement the Coronavirus Emergency Program. This program will ensure to allocate, distribute, and manage funds to purchase the following items: 10 hospital beds to provide a proper care of inmates who tested positive; disinfecting supplies for correctional facilities to comply with sanitizing protocols and the purchase of proper outfitted vehicles to transport inmates reducing the risk for exposure for correctional staff and inmates. This program will also allocate and distribute a 23% of the awarded amount to more than one local non-governmental agency offering re-entry service for ICSO prisoners.

## 7. County of Kings

**\$198,070.91**

**Lead Agency:** County of Kings Administration  
**Project Title:** Kings Expansion of Remote Technology in the Jail

The Kings County Jail proposes to upgrade technology equipment, this includes laptops, scheduling software, conferencing equipment, staff time control log in, and inmate welfare check equipment in the jail to reduce direct exposure risks to inmates and staff to COVID-19. This will also improve the technology equipment for inmates for their outside services, including court attendance, faith-based activities, and social health services. In addition, the proposed electronic equipment will also enhance current protocols that involve face to face interactions with inmates and staff at the jail.

The County anticipates partnering with Koinonia church (a non-profit agency) to provide more faith-based services to inmates.

## 8. Los Angeles County

**\$7,998,604.45**

**Lead Agency:** Department of Health Services  
**Project Title:** LA County Department of Health Services COVID Prevention and Response Strategy

Los Angeles County will be utilizing these funds for a multi-collaborative effort between Dept. of Health Services Office of Diversion and Re-Entry (ODR) and Correctional Health Services (CHS). The mutual goal is to address the re-entry needs of homeless and medically vulnerable individuals in or released from custody due to COVID-19 jail reduction plans. Program funds for the COVID Jail Release (CJR) made up of 183 beds in 8 community-based interim housing facilities to provide housing and related support services to medically vulnerable individuals being released from custody in the Los Angeles County Jail System. Los Angeles County anticipates serving 250 individuals released from jail within the 10-month grant period.

Funds will also be used to provide medical oversight for over 5,500 high risk populations residing within the jail system. Nurses will provide critical care to the most vulnerable patients including COVID testing, vaccinations, and medical assessments to prevent infections within the jail facilities.

**9. Madera County**

**\$113,036.75**

**Lead Agency:** Madera County Probation Department  
**Project Title:** Re-Entry Population Workforce Development & COVID-19 Response Program

The proposed project will accomplish three primary goals, including (1) the hiring of a part-time CCTP Career Specialist with the Workforce Development Board of Madera County to focus specifically on connecting former offenders with job training and employment programs, thus resulting in quicker access to needed services and employment in a system that has been impacted by the COVID-19 public health emergency.; (2) purchasing various items of PPE and sanitization equipment for use by various law enforcement departments within Madera County, including the Probation Department, Corrections Department, and Sheriff's Office. The new PPE will enable compliance with state and federal requirements for protection of Madera County employees at their places of work.; and (3) purchase of diagnostic COVID testing kits, gloves masks, n95 masks, face shields, and suits/coverings.

Conducting a COVID-19 testing program that will administer 300 tests for Madera County law enforcement and first responder personnel, including employees that work with pre-entry and reentry populations.

**10. Marin County**

**\$394,828.46**

**Lead Agency:** Marin County Probation Department  
**Project Title:** Reducing Vulnerabilities to COVID-19 in the Re-Entry Population

Marin County will provide emergency temporary housing to an estimated 60-70 clients that are released from custody and are placed on the waiting list for a shelter bed. Emergency housing will help to maintain the stabilization and services that the person received while in custody and provide them with a safe and sanitary location until a shelter bed becomes available. A local non-profit organization will provide case management services to persons including transport, coordination of services and general oversight.

The Jail will be resourced to create and distribute COVID-19 "Go" bags of information and resources (PPE, Sanitizers) to raise the awareness of and ability to comply with recommended sanitation and hygiene.

**11. County of Mariposa**

**\$34,916.04**

**Lead Agency:** Mariposa County Health and Human Service Agency  
**Project Title:** Vaccine Ambassador Program-Alliance for Community Transformations, subcontractor

This project will focus on reducing the barriers COVID-19 has caused for individuals through programs provided through the Vaccine Ambassador Program-Alliance. Connections will hire a part-time employee who will act as a vaccine ambassador within our homeless community and those with a connection to the criminal justice system. While individuals leaving the corrections system have had the opportunity to be vaccinated, there are also many who were released from jail prior to the vaccine being available. The vaccination will also help people to work toward stability as they will not need to worry about becoming ill with disease.

This project addresses these needs to bolster support to those now re-entering the community.

## **12. Nevada County-County Executive Office**

**\$189,613.79**

**Lead Agency:** Nevada County Department of Behavioral Health

**Project Title:** Operation HEARTH

This project will build upon some unique opportunities that have emerged during the COVID pandemic. Specifically, the County has begun utilizing a short-term navigation model for specific cohorts of homeless individuals. Called Operation HEARTH, this effort will identify a group of homeless individuals with recent incarcerations. They will be housed in a local motel for a 60-day period during which time they will be tested for COVID-19, provided access to medical care and other treatment services, and offered vaccines as available. They will receive intensive case management services with a strong focus on securing permanent housing.

This grant will augment Operation HEARTH by adding additional short-term housing for justice involved individuals, SUD treatment services, and a behavioral health nurse who will administer the vaccine, among other health related services. This funding will add considerable value and efficacy to Operation HEARTH, as the justice involved individuals with mental health conditions have posed tremendous challenges over the years to treat and house.

## **13. County of Orange**

**\$4,878,736.80**

**Lead Agency:** Health Care Agency

**Project Title:** Enhanced Care Coordination for Re-Entry During COVID

The Orange County has developed a proposal that coordinates the healthcare and care management of individuals who are COVID positive or have underlying health issues with post-custody services through a Community Based Organization to ensure access to services are available for an extended period of time after release to transition to post-custody routine care. The proposal includes the following: health assessments on individuals prior to release, ensuring health services are provided for up to 30 days after release, provide case management for health care and basic needs to promote compliance with public health orders, and provide for and obtain food delivery and maintenance equipment.

Funding is requested to provide additional contract staffing to complete the assessments, testing, tracing, and treatment plans before release from jail. Funding would also be used to cover the increased costs of test kits and processing, any necessary medication while in custody, and the cost of sufficient Sheriff staff through the use of overtime, if needed. Funding will be used for the additional increase in medication supplies as well as any necessary increase in dry and refrigerated storage space and PPE.

**14. Placer County Health and Human Services**

**\$664,209.42**

**Lead Agency:** Placer County Health and Human Services

**Project Title:** Improving Health and Access to Care for Placer's Re-Entry Population

Placer County's proposed project is multifaceted and dedicated to enhancing the COVID-19 mitigation strategies for the re-entry population, both while in custody and when entering community-based services that focus on restorative justice. This project aims to keep inmates healthy upon exiting the jails, reduce barriers to service entry, and to increase the capacity of resources that have been negatively impacted by COVID-19. These grant funds will be reducing the risk of exposure and assist with providing immediate, timely access to community-based resources by reducing some of the pandemic restrictions and limitations placed on providers as part of state-wide mitigation efforts. This project has three identified main goals: (1) Reduce COVID-19 treatment barriers for re-entry clients through increased treatment capacity (2) Enhance COVID-19 mitigation efforts for both in-custody and out of custody re-entry programs (3) Provide safe housing resources that mitigate spread of COVID-19 for re-entry population.

**15. County of Plumas**

**\$35,289.03**

**Lead Agency:** Plumas County Sheriff's Office

**Project Title:** PCCF Safe Place

This project will allow additional electronic monitoring equipment to be rented in order to reduce the income and current Correctional Facility inmate population. The goal is to reduce the inmate population allowing greater spacing and quarantine in inmates to reduce the spread of COVID-19. We aim to do so by placing inmates who are remanded from the court for low level offenses and-who do not qualify for our alternative custody program (ACP)-on house arrest through electronic monitoring. Those inmates not housed will be able to attend self-help programming through the literacy program in the community.

**16. County of Riverside**

**\$3,321,764.66**

**Lead Agency:** County of Riverside, Sheriff's Department

**Project Title:** Riverside County Re-Entry Initiative: Enhancing Ex-Offender's Transition, Recovery, and Aftercare

Riverside County's Re-Entry Initiative will provide inmate re-entry services to prepare them for transition from incarceration, back into their communities, including self-assessments to measure barriers and needs in five areas: basic needs, job search, family, wellness, and career development. Upon release, each inmate will receive a COVID- 19 PPE kit. Staff will

prepare and disseminate PPE kits to every inmate containing face masks, disposable gloves, alcohol wipes, hand sanitizer, a disposable thermometer, and an informational brochure on COVID-19 prevention. Participants will receive education on preventive infection measures, peer support, resource warm hand-off, job retention services, individualized employment assistance, free COVID- 19 testing, mentorship, and job placement. Activities are evidence-based and will reduce recidivism resulting from coronavirus economic hardship, such as homelessness due to unemployment.

This project will reduce coronavirus exposure/ risk by providing PPE to job seekers, by helping them gain employment with sick leave/health benefits to prevent transmission and improve overall stability for ex-offenders re-engaging with the community and workforce.

### **17. Sacramento County**

**\$1,286,635.35**

**Lead Agency:** Sacramento County Sheriff's Office

**Project Title:** Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding (CESF) Program

Sacramento County Sheriff's Office is applying for funding to support our ongoing mitigation and prevention efforts related to the Coronavirus at the Sacramento County Main Jail and Rio Cosumnes Correctional Center. These funds will be utilized to focus on: 1.) Providing continuity of care by ensuring adequate staffing due to COVID-19 impacts. 2.) Assist the facility in testing and vaccination of offenders. 3.) Reduce the current rate of COVID-19 transmission in correctional facilities. 4.) Continue to reduce recidivism percentages by providing reentry services and post-release community housing and an alternative to custody for short-term detox to reduce incoming COVID-19 exposure.

### **18. County of San Bernardino**

**\$2,158,476.30**

**Lead Agency:** County of San Bernardino, Law and Justice Group

**Project Title:** Coronavirus Support for the San Bernardino County Detained/Re-Entry Population

The County of San Bernardino proposes a broad range of Coronavirus support for its detained and re-entry population through three of its law and justice partners and community- based organizations. The Sheriff's Department Detention and Corrections Bureau provides appropriate sanitation, medical screening, testing, monitoring, and treatment. In addition, County jails have now become vaccination centers. The Probation Department provides proactive measures that would mitigate the potential spread of the COVID-19 virus among its at-risk reentry and homeless populations in Adult Community Corrections. This includes medication dispensing machines and purchase and distribution of hygiene and sanitation kits to clients at Day Reporting Centers. The project would also fund a mobile medical unit used to treat homeless clients.

The Department of Behavioral Health and its CBO partner Telecare Corporation propose increased access to SUD residential treatment, vaccination locations, and isolation/quarantine shelter beds necessary due to the demand from COVID-19. The proposed approach is a proactive measure that seeks to strategically target the vulnerable reentry population for a measure of hygiene and PPE equipment delivery on site.

## 19. County of San Diego

**\$4,085,425.63**

**Lead Agency:** County of San Diego, Sheriff's Department  
**Project Title:** San Diego County COVID-19 Re-Entry Service Project

The CESF Program allocation will be used to develop an information technology network across the Sheriff's seven detention facilities to expand the ability to provide COVID-19 education and information to more individuals preparing for re-entry. As the Lead Agency, the Sheriff's Department will oversee the distribution of grant funds to carry out the purposes of the CESF Program Grant and the development and implementation of an enhanced technology system for the education and training of persons in custody.

The project will entail preparing the re-entry population to prepare for and address coronavirus through the provision of COVID-19 care kits to include face coverings, toiletries, food and transportation vouchers, and informational pamphlets on pandemic, vaccine distribution, and where to access additional resources. Additional pandemic preparedness information will be disseminated via the enhanced technology system. To further mitigate the spread of the virus, the project will also entail the provision of housing with wrap-around services to support positive health outcomes and the safe transition of individuals from custody back to the community. Direct services will be provided by non-government, community-based organizations.

## 20. City and County of San Francisco

**\$286,020**

**Lead Agency:** Department of Children Youth and Their Families  
**Project Title:** San Francisco Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program

The San Francisco Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program will use funds to support the San Francisco Adult Probation Department, Juvenile Probation Department, San Francisco Public Defender's Office, San Francisco Police Department, San Francisco District Attorney's Office, and San Francisco Sheriff's Office.

CESF grant funds will support staffing needs by supporting the costs of overtime due to sick leaves from staff exposed to coronavirus or those that received positive test cases. Funds will be used to meet technology and equipment needs by departments who have needed to turn to remote services to meet reentry client's needs. Funds will also be used to meet critical basic needs with support by Visa gift cards to prevent food insecurity. CESF funds will be used to provide safe emergency housing through a hotel block rental to both unhoused individuals released from jail prior to case adjudication and other unhoused, justice-involved adult residents of San Francisco.

## 21. County of San Luis Obispo

**\$432,736.99**

**Lead Agency:** San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office  
**Project Title:** Coronavirus Re-Entry Emergency Programs



The San Luis Obispo County jail has identified three problem areas and prioritized six growing needs out of problems that will be addressed through the CESF program. The identified problem areas are an increase in the Severely Mentally Ill and Co-occurring SMI substance abuse population, a rise in discharge planning challenges for this population. and an overall decrease in the availability of programming for all inmates in jail. The six growing needs identified are: addressing increased medical and mental health needs in jail patients 2.) expanding medication options 3.) programming options during quarantine or isolation 4.) housing opportunities for re-entry 5.) facilitating warm hand-off from jail for re-entry 6.) supplying provisions and transportation for re-entry.

San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Office is proposing interventions that will aim to reduce the number of people with SMI and SUD in jail, increase connections to treatment, find housing, provide transportation, improve internal programming, and facilitate a warm hand-off to the community.

## **22. San Mateo County**

**\$1,193,398**

**Lead Agency:** San Mateo County  
**Project Title:** San Mateo County COVID- 19 Response

While San Mateo County Corrections (SMC) has had generally COVID-19 case counts, the County must invest in a long-term solution to address COVID-19 and improve processes for re-entry in health services. SMC's comprehensive strategy to prepare for, prevent, and respond to COVID-19 includes: renovating the Maguire Correctional Facility intake area to increase distancing, improve ventilation, and facilitate movement; co-locate re-entry and health services to improve teamwork and efficiency on-site; adopt the widespread use of telemedicine and remote case management to allow for reentry an health planning upon entry; provide 14 days of quarantine housing; PPE, and basic services for inmates in need upon discharge; continue providing widespread viral testing, tracing, and response; establish shared protocols and communication among service providers; and build an ongoing forum for information sharing and continuous improvement through a representative local advisory committee.

## **23. County of Santa Barbara**

**\$571,122.87**

**Lead Agency:** Department of Behavioral Wellness  
**Project Title:** Santa Barbara County Community Re-Entry Support Team (CREST)

Behavioral Wellness has designed a project to meet the unique needs of individuals who are involved in the justice systems and will support existing, effective diversion activities while decreasing the risk of COVID-19 exposure for clients, health care and justice system providers, and the community.

The focus will be on transportation from to the appropriate diversion treatment, navigation/case management, linkage to services such as behavioral health screening, housing, rapid testing, pre-paid cell phones or tablets to support telehealth options for follow up care and or virtual probation visits, and discharge planning which will ensure that individuals who have been released from jail, or have been cited and released, are assessed

and connected to appropriate Behavioral Wellness, probation, and housing services. Each component takes into consideration for overtime that may be necessary due to contact exposures and staff need to quarantine or isolate due to testing positive for COVID. Staff funded throughout this project will be employed by partnering community-based organization and will have access to adequate PPE supplies.

**24. Shasta County Probation Department**

**\$62,439.36**

**Lead Agency:** Shasta County Probation  
**Project Title:** N/A

This project is intended to prevent and mitigate the effects of COVID-19. The focus of this proposal has three main components. The first component includes increasing the capacity of YVPC to continue to provide their services virtually and to provide case management to engage the youth. The quality of the services can be enhanced by improved technology including covering of costs for the Zoom platform, upgrading computer equipment, and purchasing quality headphones for participants. The second component is to reduce the chance of transmission of the COVID-19 virus in the Probation Department offices and in Juvenile Facility by regular purchases of sanitization and PPE. The third component includes ensuring the JRF is staffed at the level required by Title 15 even when assigned staff are guaranteed in their homes.

To ensure their requirements are met, Juvenile Detention Officers and qualified Deputy Probation Officers will be required to work overtime shifts.

**25. Siskiyou County**

**\$85,924.73**

**Lead Agency:** Siskiyou County Health and Human Services-Public Health Division  
**Project Title:** COVID-19 Re-Entry Project

The project will focus on the immediate reentry needs experienced by individuals and on services and resources which COVID-19 has impacted. Upon exiting the jail, the medical discharge planner will ensure the individual is properly supplied with personal protective equipment, including masks, sanitizer, and testing center resources. The discharge planner will assist locating testing centers and in scheduling the appointment. Lastly, the discharge planner will ensure the individual is properly connected to the community based organization which will provide the remainder of grant funded services. The contracted community based organization will provide resources which are responsive to the needs of the individual, including gas vouchers, bus passes, or charter bus tickets to return home, purchase temporary shelter resources, such as tents and sleeping bags, clothing, food, and other basic necessities.

The CBO will assist the individual in acquiring items, such as photo ID or social security card, provide job resources and assistance, including job experience opportunities, local employers who hire individuals with criminal records, and assistance with resumes and applications. Should additional capacity exist under the grant, the LAC will evaluate additional services which could be offered to participants.

## 26. Solano County

**\$393,233.95**

**Lead Agency:** Solano County Probation Department  
**Project Title:** Probation Re-Entry Support Services

With the onset of the coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic, justice-involved individuals returning to the community through re-entry and those assigned to supervision conditions directly from the courts and were already struggling with stabilization and access to necessary supports and services are experiencing this proportionately excessive an extenuating barriers to successful re-entry. By providing an additional 90 days of emergency and transitional housing support for these clients, as well as by providing tools to contact and meet with clients virtually, the Solano County Probation Department can continue to provide evidence-based support to promote their successful re-entry. Additionally, ensuring sufficient staffing in the juvenile detention facility, will provide critical continuity of services for youth as they prepare for re-entry.

## 27. County of Tulare

**\$571,161.06**

**Lead Agency:** Tulare County Health and Human Services Agency  
**Project Title:** CESF Grant

The CESF Grant Funds will be utilized to enhance COVID-19 services in the jail by providing increased screening of inmates and staff. The Agency is planning to increase the discharge services to inmates currently under quarantine, isolation, and observation and purchase needed PPE for staff and inmates.

With all the COVID housing and services provided one facility, Pre-Trial Detention Facility, it was determined that this facility would benefit the most with this additional funding to continue providing enhanced services. The additional nursing staff is determined to be the highest need as well as PPE equipment and the Solaris Lytbot for disinfection. Additional planning discharge services will be provided to inmates. This additional discharge planner will also provide after-hour services for those inmates who bailout during non-working hours.

## 28. County of Tuolumne

**\$67,113.85**

**Lead Agency:** Tuolumne County Probation Department  
**Project Title:** CESF for Tuolumne County Corrections

Tuolumne County Probation Department seeks to utilize CESF to provide a plan that:  
1.) establishes adequate staffing levels to meet minimum staffing mandates in accordance with Title 15 Juvenile detention standards by providing for hiring and training up to three juvenile correctional Officer (JCO) relief staff.; 2.) provides cross-over core training to deputy officers to meet Title 15 standards when providing shift coverage in the facility.; 3.) supplies adequate personal equipment for staff and client safety.; 4.) increases the capacity of probation staff to work and train remotely.; 5.) increases the capacity of in-custody youth to communicate with their families, attorneys, etc. and access virtual mentoring and programming opportunities.; 6.) trains facility staff to administer risk and needs assessment tools to probation clients.; 7.) trains facility staff to implement evidence-based programming to probation clients.; 8.) provides supportive re-entry services (incl. transportation, treatment grants, temporary housing, meals, and other essential needs) for justice involved individuals

to prevent homelessness and reduce recidivism.; 9.) creates and incentive-based behavioral rewards program to encourage successful programming and compliance with supervision.

### **29. County of Ventura**

**Lead Agency:** Ventura County Sheriff's Office

**Project Title:** Ventura County Coronavirus Safety Equipment Funding Program

The Ventura County Coronavirus Safety Equipment Funding Program was formed through the identification of equipment that will prevent the spread, prepare for future staff needs to continue essential work, and respond to community concerns in a safe manner. Through social distancing and enhanced equipment, Sheriff's personnel will reduce the risk of transmitting the virus to others within the agency and community members. The requested equipment enhances the Sheriff's Office ability to prevent, prepare, and respond to the coronavirus consistent with the various guidelines.

The equipment needed to meet those guidelines includes: The Intercept Whole Body Scanner, dishwashers, portable restrooms, Tru-Narc device, Special Services mesh work chairs, shields, workstations/modular furniture, computers, and PPE. This Grant will help with rent assistance for Food Share (NGO) and PPE, cleaning supplies, and educational/recreational activities provided by The Boys and Girls Club of the Santa Clara Valley located in the area.

### **30. County of Yolo**

**\$263,822.08**

**Lead Agency:** County of Yolo

**Project Title:** Yolo County COVID-19 Public Safety Response  
Equipment & Testing

The Project will allow Yolo County to purchase PPE for both the Sheriff's Office and Probation Department including N95 respirators, protective face shields, disposable surgical masks, nitrile gloves, Tyvek suits, self-adhesive particle respirator, and eye protection. In addition, the Probation Department is proposing a purchase of separation liners for some vehicles as well as equipment for more effective body scanning and cleaning in detention.

The Project will also fund a community partner, Wellpath, to purchase rapid COVID-19 tests in detention facilities to ensure the safety of staff, detainees, and inmates alike. This proposal includes a funding request for both a testing machine and tests that would cover the grant period for County jail and detention facilities.

### **31. County of Yuba**

**\$102,569.95**

**Lead Agency:** County of Yuba

**Project Title:** County Administrator

Installation of bi-polar ionization to improve indoor air quality for County facilities that house both youth and adult detainees, and support operation during a health crisis. Ionization reacts with airborne contaminants, such as the coronavirus, clumps them together, then are removed

from the air through electrostatic force. This will provide better air quality for detention facilities and emergency operations center facilities. The County plans to procure and install 78 ionization systems.

The Mandatory Pass- Through will be granted to the Yuba-Sutter Habitat for Humanity, which is a non-profit organization specializing in providing housing for local residents.
