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| <p>AB 152 Board of State and Community Corrections: recidivism</p> <p>Prior Legislation: AB 1870 (2016); AB 602 (2015); AB 2521 (2014)</p> | <p>Assembly Member Gallagher (R-3)</p> | <p>Introduced 1/1/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billTextClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180 AB152</p> | <p>This bill would require the BSCC, in consultation with specified agencies, to collect and analyze data regarding recidivism rates of all persons who receive a felony sentence punishable by imprisonment in county jail or who are placed on post release community supervision on or after July 1, 2018. 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| <p>AB 223 Commercial sexual Exploitation of youth: services.</p> | <p>Assembly Member Eggman (D-13)</p> | <p>Amended (3/15/17) http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180 AB223</p> | <p>This bill would require the BSCC to establish pilot programs in Alameda, Sacramento and San Joaquin counties to address the need for services relating to the commercial sexual exploitation of youth. If the county elects to participate, the chief probation officer of each county would be required to create a program, licensed by the Department of Social Services. 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| <p>AB 298 Immigration Holds</p> | <p>Assembly Member Gallagher (R-3)</p> | <p>Introduced: 2/6/2017 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180AB298</p> | <p>This bill would require a local law enforcement official to cooperate with federal immigration officials by detaining an individual convicted of a felony on the basis of an immigration hold for up to 48 hours, as specified, after the person becomes eligible for release from custody if continued detention on the basis of the immigration hold would not violate federal law. By creating new duties for local officials, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill would require the board to select 6 counties to receive funding and would require the board to issue grants in an amount of not less than \$300,000 and not more than \$2,000,000, up to a maximum of \$10,000,000. The bill would require the board to award grants to local law enforcement agencies to provide supplemental law enforcement services to private schools, as provided. | SB 54 Law enforcement: sharing data. | Senator De Leon (D-24) | Amended 3/29/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB54 | This bill would, among other things, prohibit state and local law enforcement agencies and school police and security departments from using resources to investigate, interrogate, detain, detect, or arrest persons for immigration enforcement purposes. This bill further states: "Nothing in this chapter prohibits or restricts any government entity or official from sending to, or receiving from, federal immigration authorities, information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of an individual pursuant to Sections 1373 and 1644 of Title 8 of the United States Code." | This bill may impact California's eligibility for Federal grant awards. | 4/4/17-Held at Desk in Assembly. 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| <p>SB 215 Incarcerated persons: victim advocates</p> | <p>Senator Beall (D-15)</p> | <p>Amended 3/6/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB215</p> | <p>This would require each state prison and county jail to provide incarcerated persons with reasonable access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse, domestic violence, and suicide prevention by allowing incarcerated persons to call the toll-free hotlines of organizations that provide mental health crisis support. Section 1067 of Title 15 requires that written policies and procedures be developed to allow reasonable access to telephones in local detention facilities. This measure would likely require the BSCC to modify its Title 15 regulations to account for this specific type of access.</p> | <p>The BSCC may need to modify its Title 15 regulations to account for this specific type of access</p> | <p>4/4/17 In Senate. 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| <p>SB 453 Correctional facilities: construction and renovation</p> | <p>Senator Vidak (R-14)</p> | <p>Amended: 4/17/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billTextClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180 SB453</p> | <p>Existing law establishes the BSCC and requires the board to, among other things, establish minimum standards for local correctional facilities, as specified. Existing law requires the plans and specifications of every jail, prison, or other place of detention of persons charged with or convicted of crime or of persons detained pursuant to the Juvenile Court Law or the Youth Authority Act, if those plans and specifications involve construction, reconstruction, remodeling, or repairs of an aggregate cost in excess of \$15,000,000 to be submitted to the board for its recommendations. This bill would appropriate \$12,000,000 from the General Fund in specified amounts to the Cities of Orange Cove, Woodlake, and Parlier, for the purposes of constructing, renovating, or relocating police department facilities, whether in new buildings or existing buildings that have been renovated.</p> | <p>BSCC would be a pass-through agency</p> | <p>4/17/17 Amended by author and re-referred to Senate Committee on Public Safety</p> |

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| <p>SB 502 California Voluntary Tattoo Removal Program</p> | <p>Senator Portantino (D- 25)</p> | <p>Amended: 3/29/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180 SB502</p> | <p>Would reestablish and modify a recently repealed program known as the California Voluntary Tattoo Removal Program, to be administered by BSCC to the extent that funds are appropriated, to provide funding for the removal of certain tattoos for individuals between 14 and 24 years of age, who are in the custody of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation or county probation departments, who are on parole or probation, or who are in a community-based program serving at-risk youth, or who are placed in foster care as either dependent children or nonminor dependents, as specified, and who meet specified criteria. 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| SB 630 Jails: financing bonds | Senator Skinner (D-9) | Amended: 4/6/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billTextClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB630 | This bill would require a participating county that plans to use any of the State Public Works Board -issued revenue bonds, notes, or bond anticipation notes to finance the acquisition, design, and construction of approved adult local criminal justice facilities funds for any project, regardless of whether or not that project increases housing capacity, that is approved by the BSCC on or after the effective date of this act, to certify in writing that it is not presently, nor will it for a period of 10 years following the completion of construction, lease jail housing capacity to any private or public entity. 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| <p>SB 635 Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development: Office of the Promise Zone Coordinator</p> | <p>Senator Hueso (D-40)</p> | <p>Introduced: 2/17/17 http://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180 SB635</p> | <p>This bill establishes within the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development the Office of the Promise Zone Coordinator to provide state assistance to federal Promise Zones within California that are designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all of its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of California Promise Zone.</p> | <p>BSCC duties are under review</p> | <p>4/18/17 first hearing set for 4/24/17 canceled at the request of the author.</p> |
